Deadline Set For Advice On O. & C. Land Sales

The Bureau of Land Management advises that Aug. 15 is the deadline for prospective purchasers to submit to District Forester J. E. Slattery their suggestions as to the O. & C. Coos Bay Way on Road and intermingled public domain timber which they would like considered for advertising for sale during the 1950 calendar year.

By Aug. 15 all such suggestions must be submitted to the district forester who, in consultation with his advisory board, will evolve a timber sales program for the ensuing calendar year based on "sound principles of forest management," taking into account, insofar as possible, the expressed interest of purchasers.
