Here's How To Fix Barbecued Chops

In Gallatin, Mo., you'll find Virginia McDonald and her fabulous tearoom. Both are known all over the United States by people who enjoy fine American food.

Read on, and right here you'll find two of Virginia McDonald's most popular dishes. They come from her new cook book, called "How I Cook It." If you can't get to Gallatin, better get her book—that is, if you like fine American eating.

Barbecued Chops
"One of the most wonderful meats I fix is my barbecued chops, ribs, or beef," she says. "Everyone who tastes them asks for the recipe—and here it is."
One and one-half pounds of meat—pork chops, spare ribs or beef, 1 tablespoon celery seed, 1 tablespoon chili powder, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon salt, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1 cup tomato puree, 1/2 cup vinegar.

If chops are used, have them cut thick. If spare ribs are used, have them cut in individual servings. The meat does not take the seasoning so well if it is in large pieces. Make a dry sauce by mixing the celery seed, chili powder, brown sugar, salt and paprika. Rub most of this on the meat and let it stand overnight. To the remaining dry sauce add the tomato puree and vinegar and bake the meat with this as it cooks in the oven.

Chicken Croquettes
"My chicken croquettes are mighty well liked by everyone. You'll say they are the best you ever ate."

One hen, salt and pepper, celery salt, milk, butter, flour, 1/2 cup blanched slivered almonds, 1 egg, cracker crumbs.
Stew or bake the chicken whole. Remove meat and skin from bones and cut meat in large cubes. Season with salt, pepper and celery salt. For every 1 1/2 cups of chicken, measure 1 cup of milk, 2 tablespoons butter and 3 tablespoons of flour; combine and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add chicken and almonds. Mix well and cool. Cut croquettes in 2-inch squares or oblongs, form in balls or mold in the form of chicken legs. Beat egg slightly and add 1 tablespoon of cold water. Dip croquettes in egg, then in crumbs, and fry in deep, hot fat.

Oregon Prisoner Confesses Killing Man In Arizona

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 13—(AP)—Sheriff Denver Young said Friday that a 32-year-old man arrested here last week has admitted killing Charles T. Shoop, 5, near Phoenix, Ariz., last May.

The sheriff said Edward Charles McEwen, Lodi, Calif., made the admission to Arizona officers who came here to question him.

McEwen, who had been sought on a first-degree murder complaint issued in Maricopa county, Ariz., was arrested in the Willamette Valley last week on a charge of driving a stolen car.

McEwen almost escaped from the jail here Sunday night. He and three fellow-prisoners had saved their way almost through the cell bars when a passerby heard the sawing and notified the sheriff's office.

The sheriff said that McEwen was also questioned about the slaying of Tex Thornton at Amarillo, Tex., last month, but told police he knew nothing of it.

Shoop, a citrus grower, was found strangled in a dry irrigation ditch near Phoenix, Ariz., last May 12. Police said he was last seen alive in a cafe with McEwen.

Playing Boy Is Killed By His Uncle's Truck

BAKER, Aug. 13—(AP)—A three-year-old boy at Huntington was run over and killed Friday by a milk truck operated by his uncle.

The boy, Danny Leudermilk, son of Mrs. Delphia Leudermilk, Huntington City Recorder, was playing with some other youngsters at the home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Burgess, Lyle Endicott, the child's uncle, drove up to deliver milk. The child dashed behind the truck and the driver did not see him when he pulled away. County Coroner Thad Beatty said the child died instantly.
