Perennial Flowers From Seed Are As Easy To Grow As Vegetables

To grow perennial flowers from seed, it is far better to sow them in the early spring than to wait for summer. There is no way in which an amateur can save money faster than by growing his own plants of those perennials which "come true" from seed. Peonies, iris, and some others take several years to reach flowering size, and then cannot be depended to resemble the varieties from which seed were saved. But columbines, delphinium, coropsis, hardy pinks, shasta daisies, hollyhocks, pyrethrum, poppies, and many other lovely kinds of the highest quality can be grown to full maturity in one year. Many of them, sown early this spring, will give their first blossoms before the season ends; and for years to come will be beautiful performers in your garden pageant. Amateurs who have found difficulty growing summer-sown perennials are usually surprised at the difference, when seed is sown in the spring. The usual practice is to sow the seed in boxes, or in a seed bed; then to transplant to garden rows as soon as the seedling plants are large enough to handle. Give them space in the row to grow until fall when they will usually be ready to take their place in the decorative border. If you have vegetable plot, perennials can be grown there and given the same feeding and cultivation. Most of them are as easy to grow as the vegetables. Plants are difficult to grow in large scale operations because of the limited area over which they can be distributed satisfactorily and the high cost of packing such fragile subjects for shipment. The gardener who grows his own pays only for the seed. The task of caring for the plants and observing their growth is a fascinating recreation, if he is a true garden fan. Vatican Names 2 New Bishops In Slovakia

PRAGUE, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The Vatican has appointed two new bishops in Slovakia in an action which may cause a new clash between church and state here, it was disclosed yesterday. The new appointees are Monsignor Ambrosius Lazik, who has been serving as apostolic administrator of Trnava, and Monsignor Robert Pobozy, who has been capitular vicar of Roznava. They are to be consecrated Sunday. Both have expressed their loyalty to the nation's primate, Archbishop Josef Beran, by signing his last pastoral letter. The letter was issued June 26, and it accused the Czechoslovak government of persecuting the church and attempting to crush religious liberty. This pastoral letter has been denounced by the government as a "subversive and anti-state document." The possibility of a new state-church clash over these appointments arises out of the unofficial agreement under which the state maintains the right to reject or approve any candidate for bishop proposed by the Vatican. However, the Vatican diplomatic representative here claimed this issue had been circumvented. He said that the two new Slovakian bishops were not named bishops in residence but merely titular bishops.

Unusual Data Turned In On N. Y. City Heat Wave

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—(AP)—An enterprising reporter has dug up some unusual data about New York City's heat wave that the Weather Bureau doesn't supply. While the official reading atop the Whitehall building in lower Manhattan stood at a record high of 98.1 degrees Thursday, the reporter went roving with a thermometer and recorded these temperatures: 103 degrees inside a policeman's shoes, 130 degrees on a tiled rooftop, 93 degrees in an air-conditioned elevator, 37 degrees in a plane 17,000 feet above the city. After a quick thundershower sent the official temperature down to 81, the reporter said, the city was as cool as a cucumber—in fact, cooler. A vegetable stand cucumber was 92.

Greyhound Bus Line Strike On One System Ended

SEATTLE, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The first direct Greyhound bus left for the east via Butte, Mont., Thursday after settlement of an strike between Butte and Chicago. Meantime the North Coast Greyhound lines' strike, which has halted service between Vancouver, B. C. and Portland, entered its eighth week. The Butte-Chicago settlement ended a 105-day walkout. Striking drivers on that route voted 1,051 to 112 for acceptance of the company's latest wage offer. Service was being resumed in Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois, Wisconsin and Montana, and in Manitoba.

During the mid-west strike eastbound passengers were taken to Butte from Seattle and routed further east via Ogden, Utah.

Old Grist Mill Stones Go To Oregon Museum

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 13.—(AP)—Grist mill stones, which ground out flour in 1828 for the Pacific northwest's first food industry, started to a museum today. They were picked up from the old grist mill, seven miles east of here, and taken to old Fort Vancouver for repair by Louis Caywood, archaeologist for the National Park Service. Later the stones will be turned over to the Oregon Historical society for exhibition with other historic relics. The English-made stones were brought here by the Hudson's Bay company 121 years ago.

Fourth Rich Sicilian Kidnaped For Ransom

PALERMO, Sicily, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Armed, masked bandits kidnaped a 62-year-old baron Friday, the fourth rich Sicilian to be seized for ransom in the past few days. Police blamed the kidnappings on Salvatore Giuliano's bandit gang. The baron, Gabriele Dara, was kidnapped while riding in a bus with some 20 other persons about 30 miles from Palermo.
