

The graying, 53-year-old soldier-one of the handsomest men in the army-was one of the most colorful and energetic field commanders of the second world war.

He was tough and cool and won his battles first hand. He ran his famous seventh corps as efficiently as any top business executive. This was his battle formula: "Outguess the enemy, keep him off balance and never stop driving."

It was first to crack the Siegfried line and capture a major German city—Aachen. It took Cologne, too, expanded the first bridgehead across the Rhine at Remagen, and at war's end linked up with the Russians along the Elbe.

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

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
