Southern Oregon's first profes sional horse racing meet, com-plese with pari-mutuel wagering, opens tonight at the Douglas county fairgrounds. Post time is 7:30 p.m., but pari-mutuel wager-ing windows will open at 6:45 p.m. Admission is 50 cents for adults.

Approximately 5,000 spectators jammed the grandstand last night at the free dress rehearsal of the meet put on by track officials to acquaint officers and spectators alike with procedures to be followed during the 10-day session, which runs through August 27.

The fans got quite an eyeful. Two fast races were put on, along with an exhibition event, and after the regular show a large share of the people remained to watch other horses being worked out under unfamiliar lights.
