

Exhibition Horse Races Launch 10-Day Program

Throng Jams Grandstand At Fairgrounds

Three Quarter Horses Sprint In First Event, 4 Thoroughbreds In 2nd

Southern Oregon's first professional horse racing meet, complete with pari-mutuel wagering, opens tonight at the Douglas county fairgrounds. Post time is 7:30 p.m., but pari-mutuel wagering windows will open at 6:45 p.m. Admission is 50 cents for adults.

Approximately 5,000 spectators jammed the grandstand last night at the free dress rehearsal of the meet put on by track officials to acquaint officers and spectators alike with procedures to be followed during the 10-day session, which runs through August 27.

The fans got quite an eye-full. Two fast races were put on, along with an exhibition event, and after the regular show a large share of the people remained to watch other horses being worked out under unfamiliar lights.

Race Results
In the first race, a 220-yard event by quarter horses, Magnolia, with little Pete Pattio aboard, broke fast, jumped to a quick lead, and increased it to win going away by two lengths. Miss Fitz was second, and Chiquita Mia was third.

The second race was a thoroughbred event, with four horses entered, over a five-eighths of a mile course. Supreme Boy, with Jockey J. Ellsworth up, took a head lead on the first turn and increased it to half a length in the back stretch. But coming into the last turn Crusabelle, under S. Hoff-singer, began to come up fast, going into the home stretch neck-and-neck with Supreme Boy.

The crowd came to its feet, roaring with excitement, as the pair thundered across the line in a photo finish, with Crusabelle the winner by a nose. Border Gypsy was third, and Record Crop fourth.

Horse Runs Bare
As an added attraction an exhibition race was run by Flicka F., a quarter horse, owned by James Reece of Temple, Oklahoma, and trained by O. R. Snow. Flicka F. is a stablemate of the I med Badger's Grey Lady, one of the world's top quarter horses, who runs tonight in the Topper stake race.

Flicka F. thundered down the 220-yard stretch in front of the grandstands, eased up after crossing the finish line, and pulled up sharply as she caught sight of the Grey Lady, who had been brought out on the track. The remarkable

Cubs Defeat Cards; Phils Edge Dodgers

Benton, Detroit Cast-Off, Beats Old Mates, Upping Cleveland In Standings

Curv-balling Kenny Heintzelman has whipped the Cardinals three times this season. Yet he probably would be elected mayor of St. Louis if he chose to run. Heintzelman has one recommendation that already has endeared him to the hearts of all St. Louisans. He is the only pitcher who holds five straight decisions over the Cards' most hated rivals, the Brooklyn Dodgers. Ken is practically a St. Louis citizen, having been born in Perdue, Mo.

Were it not for the crafty Philadelphia lefthander the Dodgers now would be leading the Cardinals by a comfortable margin in their battle for the National league pennant.

As it is, the Brooks own only a slender half-game edge today. The Cards blew a 4-2 lead in the ninth yesterday when the Chicago Cubs rallied for three runs to win, 5-4. That put the Redbirds a full game behind. A Brooklyn victory over Philadelphia would have meant a game and a half advantage.

That's where Heintzelman came in. Not content with four straight successes over them, Ken had to hurl a seven-hitter to whip the Dodgers for the fifth time, 2-1. It took his mates 12 innings to win it for him, but that they did when Richie Ashburn tripled in Kenny in the top of the third extra frame. Heintzelman had reached base on a force out, Don Newcombe was the losing hurler.

An old St. Louis nemesis, Johnny Schmitz, combined with Cub first baseman Herman Reich to clip the Redbirds. Schmitz, always tough for the Cards to beat, gained his second win over them with a one-inning relief stint. Reich came through twice with the bases loaded to drive in four runs. He singled in the fourth with the bags occupied, and doubled in the ninth under the same circumstances.

Al Benton, a 38-year-old cast-off, pitched the Cleveland Indians to second place in the torrid American league race. Benton, released last year by Detroit, stopped his former mates with six hits as the Indians shut out the Tigers, 5-0. The triumph put the Tribe two percentage points over the Boston Red Sox and three and a half games behind the pace-setting New York Yankees. Rain washed out the scheduled Yankee-Washington game.

The Philadelphia Athletics defeated Boston, 7-4, to snap a seven-game winning streak for the Red Sox. The defeat dropped the Sox three and a half games behind the Yankees. Sam Chapman's eighth-inning home run started a four-run rally that spelled defeat for young Maurice McDermott. The victory shoved the Athletics into fourth place, a half game above the Tigers.

Lefty Monte Kennedy pitched the New York Giants to a 4-0 victory over the Boston Braves. Rookie Lloyd Merriman singled in the winning run as the Cincinnati Reds nipped the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-1, in a 10-inning thriller. Howie Fox won the pitchers' duel from Bob Chesnes. Harry Walker had 10 putouts for the Reds, one short of the record set by left fielders.

Southpaw Bob Kuzava pitched the Chicago White Sox to a 4-0 triumph over the St. Louis Browns. He allowed only three hits for his eighth victory. He has lost only two.

Chiefs Edge County Stars By 7-6 Score

Locals Forced To Work Hard To Post Victory Over Visiting Talent

The Roseburg Chiefs defeated an all-star aggregation of north Douglas county baseball talent, 7-6, at Finlay field last night, but in so doing, had to hustle every minute of the way. Five all-star runs were earned but only three Chiefs runs were earned.

The Chiefs were stumped for four innings, with the visitors leading 2-0 until Earl Hampton scored the first Roseburg run in the fourth.

Ted Wilson started the ball rolling in the fifth, when with two men on, he tripled to put the Chiefs ahead 3-2. George Sanders also scored that inning, and Roseburg stayed ahead from then on.

The visitors, composed of the best players from Drain, Yoncalla, Elkton and Oakland, came within inches of winning the tussle, when with one away in the eighth, pitcher George Sanders, who relieved Vic Lewis in the sixth, allowed the bases to become filled. Two succeeding outs eased the situation for Roseburg.

All-Star hurler Lefty Floyd pitched a superb game for four innings, but in the fifth, Chiefs batters relieved him of four runs on one hit, two errors and three bases on balls.

Behind 5-2, the visitors narrowed the gap with two runs in the top of the sixth. Norv Richie, first man to face relief pitcher George Sanders, slammed a triple that scored Frank Jacobs, who had drawn a walk. Richie scored on a ground out.

Roseburg was ahead 6-4 in the top of the eighth, then the All-Stars again came within one run of tying up the game on a run scored by Red Cole, who walked, then scored on "Velvi Jones" single. All-Stars filled the sacks in the same frame, but all hands died thereon.

The Chiefs racked up a final counter in the bottom half of the eighth, when Ray Stratton tallied on a blow by Ted Wilson.

All-Stars again came within hailing distance of a win in the top of the ninth, on Norv Richie's single that scored Les Riley, but a second and third out ended the contest in Roseburg's favor.

Lewis gave up five hits for three runs in five-plus innings, while Sanders also gave up five hits for two runs in four innings.

All-Star pitcher Lefty Floyd issued three hits that were good for five runs. Johnson, battling for Floyd in the sixth, continued on the mound. He gave up six hits for two runs.

Dusette, Williams Will Head Saturday Night Mat Program; Szasz Vs. Falletti In Opener

There has been lots of title talk in Douglas county wrestling circles during the past week, but as far as local fans will get to a championship affair Saturday night at the Roseburg armory will be a test involving Al Williams and Georges Dusette. Both are certainly championship caliber, and proved it here last Saturday—Williams measuring Pierre LaBelle and Dusette taking a decision over Leo Karlanko, the "Mad Russian," in impressive style.

Dusette, who was tricked by Buck Weaver in one of the light-heavyweight tournament matches here some weeks ago, had challenged Weaver to a match for the coast crown. Weaver turned down the challenge, saying that he wanted to collect from his newly-acquired title and wanted no help of the French-Canadian.

Matchmaker Elton Owen said he hoped to match the winner of the Williams-Dusette match against Frankie Stojack, erstwhile coast junior heavyweight titleholder, in an effort to find the best possible opponent for the new champ—Jack McLaughlin of Vancouver, B.C.

Williams, the Chicago villain, stands in danger of losing his first decision since his recent return to the northwest in the skirmish against Dusette, who has developed a new attack. Georges still employs his full-nelson, but the powerfully built grappler has been softening up his rivals with a headlock before putting on the full-nelson clincher. He employed these tactics successfully against Karlanko, so it will be a battle between Dusettes full-nelson and Williams hammerlock and assorted illegal tactics.

The three-half semi-final will also attract considerable local interest, with Al Szasz, the popular little Hungarian, against Tony Falletti, the Brooklyn bomber.

Interest in the two-star show is high, and fans are urged to make early-week ringside reservations at Powell's.
