The Oaks came from behind Tuesday night to lace the Stars, 7 to 3, in the opener of their crucial seven-game series. Hollywood went ahead, 3 to 2, in the seventh but Earl Rapp's three-run triple in the Oaks' half of the inning put Oakland ahead for good.

The win put the Oaks but five games behind Hollywood. However, Sacramento also is tied for second place by virtue of a 7-to-4 win over San Diego. The Solons exploded for five runs in the ninth inning. Padre Max West, the league's top home run slugger, hit No. 38.

In the battle of the cellar, Con Dempsey of San Francisco tossed a four-hitter at lowly Los Angeles for a 9-to-0 blankout. It was Con's 14th win.

Charley Schanz notched his 17th win of the year as Seattle took a 4-to-3 tenth-inning decision from Portland. Heinz Beckler, who scored three of the Rainiers' four, doubled in the tenth and came home on Bill Ramsey's single for the ball game.
