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Chamber Of Commerce Men Enjoy Horseback Trek Over Woods, Except For Soreness

Sixty miles by horseback over rugged mountain terrain — that was the trip taken last weekend by seven Roseburg Chamber of Commerce members, supervised by George Churchill, Glide district ranger, and Ray Hampton of the Roseburg office of the forest service.

Douglas county's vast timber reserve and the need for developing access roads to make possible harvesting of mature and overripe forests were pointed out to the local business men.

Making the trip were John Todd, chamber president; Tom Pargeter, George Luoma, Roland West, Frank Denton, Jim Myers and Earl Wiley. Upon their return they were formally initiated into the ROPB (definition supplied by the forest service) to which any person who travels over 25 miles by horseback in one day in the mountains is eligible.

The group drove Friday morning to the end of Little river road, then continued on horses, supplied by the forest service, along with four pack mules. The Little river road built by government access road funds, was pointed out as an example of possible development.

The party lunched at noon at Lake of the Woods and went on to Quartz mountain guard station. They took a side trip to Flat Rock, where they obtained

an excellent view of the vast timbered area. They returned to Quartz mountain for the night.

Saturday they continued up Quartz mountain along the old stock driveway to Twin Lakes lookout, where they spent the night. Some of the men had an opportunity to fish. West is still talking about the big one he hooked but lost because the fish was too heavy for his tackle.

The group Sunday went over to Snowbird camp and on down Emile trail to Lookout mountain, for lunch with the lookout. They continued on down to Emile guard station, traveling 28 miles the last day. The trip took them on a circular route over much of the area between Little river and the North Umpqua.

Ranger Churchill and Hampton, in addition to pointing out timber resources and the need for access roads, explained proposed developments under sustained yield. The party also interviewed the lookouts. Two areas being surveyed for access roads were viewed. These roads cannot be built until funds are available.

The men reported that, aside from a certain amount of soreness, they found the trip very interesting. The weather was ideal and the scenery almost incomparable. They also highly praised the camp cookery of Churchill.

Queen Will Be Chosen For Rodeo At Myrtle Creek

Queen of the Myrtle Creek Saddle Pals rodeo will be selected Sunday, Aug. 28, at 2 p. m. at the Myrtle Creek rodeo grounds. The queen will rule over the Labor day rodeo Sunday and Monday, Sept. 4 and 5.

Three judges have been selected by officers of the club to pick the queen and her court from among the contestants by their appearance, ability to ride, and their horses.

Any single girl between the ages of 16 and 21 is eligible to contest for queen.

The two contestants scoring highest after the queen will be selected as princesses.

There will also be try-outs among club members for the relay race and stake race teams.

Several bucking horses will be on the grounds for anyone wishing to try them out.

There will be no admission charged at the tryouts Sunday afternoon and the public is welcome to attend, announced M. M. Knutson, publicity chairman.
