Blend shortening and sugar thoroughly; add egg and best well. Stir in bran and milk; let soak until most of moisture is taken up. Sift flour with baking powder and sait: mix with blueberries, add to first mixture and stir only until combined. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full and bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) 23 to 30 minutes.
