

Unions Authorize Strike Against Union Pacific R. R.

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 30-(P)-Engineers and conductors unions have authorized a strike, effective Oct. 1. against the Union Pacific railroad in five western states, officials announced to-

that negotiations with management might result in postponing of the projected walkout. An-

of the projected walkout. Announcement of the strike action was made here by H. W. Corbett of Pocatello, general chairman of the Order of Rallway Conductors, and in Namga. Idaho, by D. W. Brassey, chairman of the Nampa local of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

In both cases the dispute involves time claims which have been rejected during the past tiree years, union spokesmen said. Union Pacific rallroad authorities declined to comment.

The area involved extends from Huntington, Ore., on the west, through southern Idaho to Granger, Wyo., and from Salt Lake City north to Butte, Mont.

2nd Barely Saved

ELLENSBURG, Wash., Aug. 30.

(A)—One of three Ellensburg city jail prisoners who broke into a supply room in the jail tank is dead and another seriously ill from drinking anti-freeze fluid, Coroner Henry Wager said.

McCullin Bradley, 45, a translent worker from Delaware, was dead when found in the cell Menday morning by officers who attempted to waken him for break fast. He had been arrested early Sunday on a charge of drinking in public.


Roy F. Comstock, 35, of Illinois, was near death, but was resuscitated by an Ellensburg fire department crew. Comstock had been arrested early Sunday on drunkenness charges.

A third prisoner, Hadsell Brumbaugh of Seattle, also drank some of the anti-freeze but not enough of manual control of the seriously ill, Wager said.

The fluid was of the permanent anti-freeze type and had been stored in the supply room in the jail tank after it was drained from police vehicles last winter.

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
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
