ANNUAL PICNIC IS HELD BY GRANGE

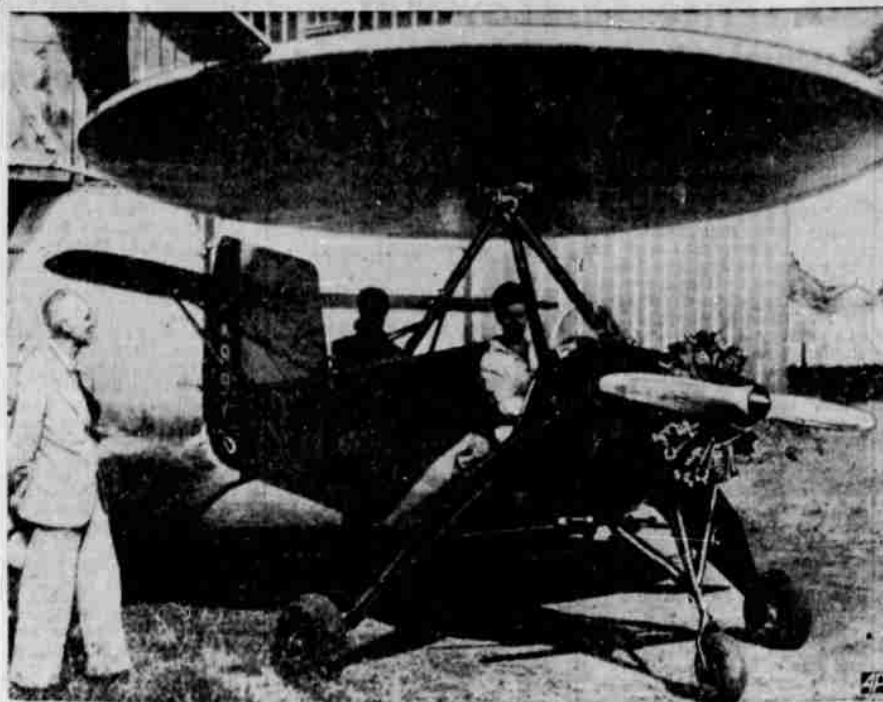

Business Failures Last Week Reveal Decrease

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Business failures in the week ended Aug. 25 declined to 176 from 193 the previous week, Dun & Bradstreet reported.

Casualties for the latest week compared with 96 in the comparable period last year, 59 in 1947 and 264 in 1939. Manufacturing failures fell to 41 from 61 the previous week. Wholesale and commercial service failures also declined, but retail casualties increased to 90 from 85 and construction to 13 from 10. Failures were more numerous than a year ago in all industry and trade groups, the credit reporting agency said.

Casualties in the Pacific states rose to 48 from 37.

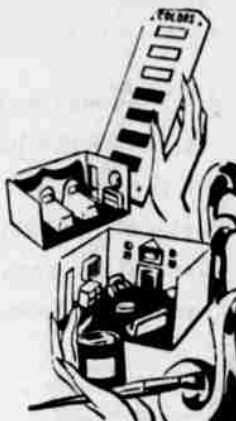

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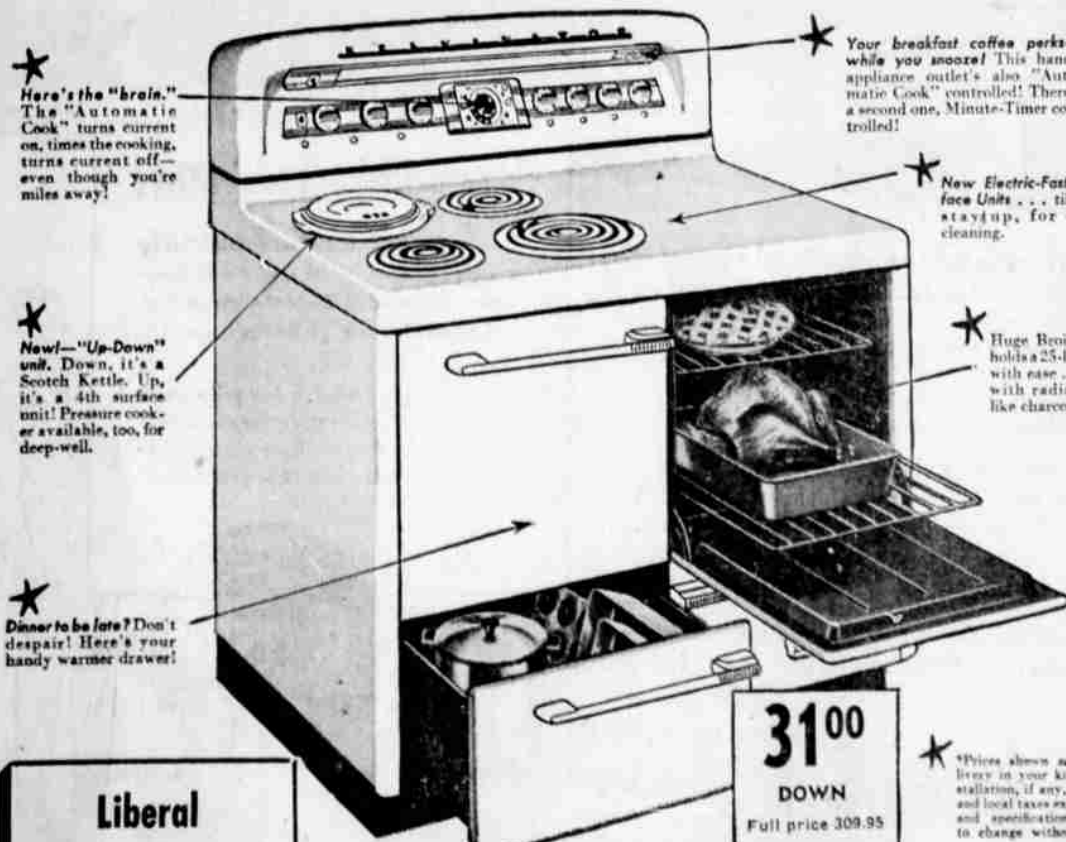
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
