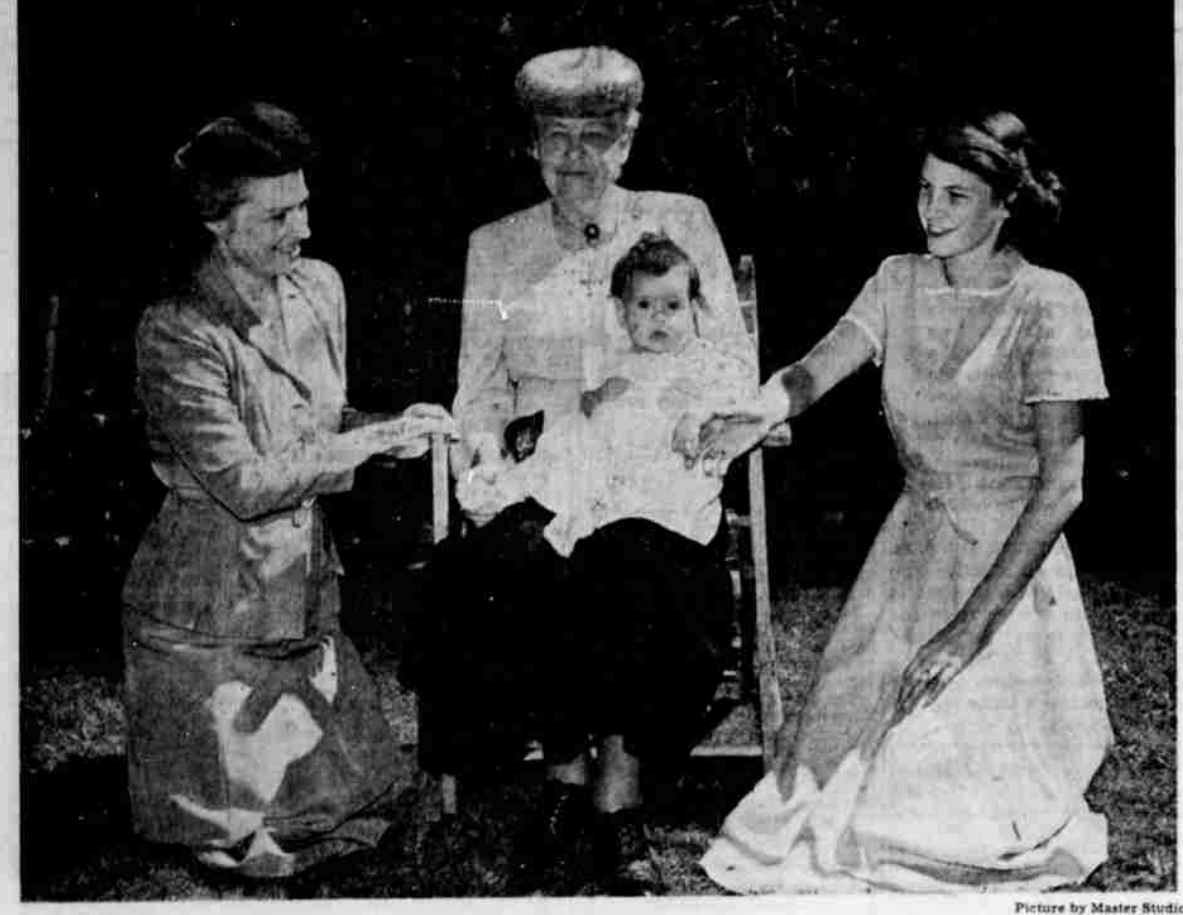
Gifts were presented to Mr. Payne in honor of the occasion.
