

Korea Coddles Turtle Declared 1,000 Years Old

SEOUL, Sept. 6.—(AP)—No turtle ever had it so good. But then not every turtle is six feet long and 1,000 years old.

The turtle, downed a crock of wine the first thing when fishermen lugged him ashore a few days ago. The fishermen gave him a second crockful, then a third. He drained them without a hiccup.

"Didn't hurt him at all," President Syngman Rhee of the South Korean Republic told his news conference.

When Rhee heard about the remarkable catch he ordered the turtle brought to the Seoul zoo. (Rhee takes the fishermen's estimate that any turtle that big is bound to be 1,000 years old. Fishermen know more about turtle ages than presidents.)

Furthermore, Rhee has directed various official functionaries to find out the latest in the care and feeding of turtles.

"It's an omen," Rhee huffed. "It means prosperity for the nation. The turtle is our symbol of longevity and prosperity."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The South Korean Republic has called for American advice on the care and feeding of a 500-pound (and maybe 1,000-year-old) turtle.

The appeal for Yankee know-how was telephoned to the Associated Press Washington Bureau by Phillip Han, first secretary of the Korean embassy.

Western Chicken Flocks Hit By New Disease

PULLMAN, Wash., Sept. 6.—(AP)—A disease new to western chicken flocks has started causing trouble for Pacific Northwest poultrymen.

Dr. E. H. Peterson, assistant professor of poultry pathology at Washington State college, said the disease has been known in the east for some time as epidemic tremors, a virus disease that usually affects chickens during the first six weeks after they are hatched.

A laboratory test is necessary to detect the virus, he said. Symptoms include tremors of the head and some paralysis of the bird's legs and wings.

Although the disease apparently does not affect adult chickens nor the hatchability of eggs, Dr. Peterson advises poultrymen not to use any flock that has suffered from the disease for hatching egg supplies.

Motorist Flout Bus Stop Law, School Head Reports

ONTARIO, Ore., Sept. 6.—(AP)—School Superintendent Arthur Kiesz has popped up with a fear that Oregon's new law requiring motorists to stop for halted school buses is dangerous.

Not that Kiesz objects to the law, which he thinks a good one. "The trouble is," he explained, "that the motorists don't obey it."

The school superintendent said one school bus driver reported only two motorists had stopped for his loading and unloading bus so far. All the rest whizzed past—often so fast he couldn't get their license numbers.

Violators whose licenses are noted are being turned over to the state police. Kiesz said the danger lies in the fact that youngsters, hearing that cars are supposed to stop for school buses now, may not use as much caution upon descending as they did before.

Workers Will Aid Store With Fund For Advertising

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—(AP)—A department store workers' union plans a drive to bring in new business and help the boss make money.

The AFL Retail Clerks local whose members work at the John Wanamaker Department store, will start their campaign next week by spending \$5,000 for newspaper advertisements.

Paul P. Milling, the Local's president, said the 1,900 union members recognize that it is in their interest for the store to prosper.

Costello May Be Summoned In 5 Percent Probe

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) said today he will insist that Frank Costello of New York, reputed "slot machine king," be called as a witness in the senate investigation of "five percenters."

"I think Costello is a very necessary and important witness," McCarthy told a reporter.

McCarthy is a member of the senate investigations subcommittee which has been digging into the question of whether there has been improper influence in letting of federal contracts. He has mentioned Costello's name several times during the hearings.

On one occasion, McCarthy asked Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, President Truman's military aide, whether Vaughan got any campaign funds from Costello.

Vaughan said he had never even heard of Costello and that he was sure none of the money came from him.

Today, McCarthy said he wants to ask Costello "about a number of things that have cropped up in the investigation but I can't disclose them now or it would foul things up."

The senate hearings are in recess now, probably for about a month. Meantime, the staff and investigators are running down a number of tips and collecting data that may be disclosed later at public sessions.

Government agencies are moving to shut their doors against five percenters.

Chairman Hoey (D-N. C.) of the senate investigations subcommittee recessed the inquiry while the staff studies the evidence taken thus far.

Middleman Now Taboo
The government's chief purchasing officer, Jess Larson, assured the senators before the hearings closed that the middleman in government contracting is on the way out.

Larson, who heads the new government services administration, testified that he, Secretary of Defense Johnson and Budget Director Frank Pace had worked out a plan to make direct contracting easier for small businessmen.

Unethical firms will be black-listed and federal employees warned about taking favors, he said, adding:

"It is my honest opinion that this procedure, together with the policy of decentralizing procurement and the maintaining of adequate, courteous and efficient information centers will cause the so-called five percenter to wane and die because there will be no need for his services."

The term five percenter has been used to describe those who seek out government contracts for others for a fee—usually five percent. That activity isn't illegal, but the senate group has been searching for signs that it involved "influence peddling."

Spokane Houses Scarce Despite Landlords' Talk
SPOKANE, Sept. 6.—(AP)—House hunting has increased sharply since Spokane went off rent control in July, a report indicates.

Mrs. Dudley Gunn, secretary of the mayor's coordinating council, said more persons asked her office for help in finding housing last month than in any month since the council was organized several years ago.

She said she had 659 office visitors, 3952 office calls and 311 calls at home during the month. The council found places for 96 families.

Only 11 persons told her they were moving because rents had been increased, she said.

She said there were indications that few vacant housing units have been placed on the market since decontrol. Spokesmen for landlords said earlier 1,000 vacant units would be offered for rent when controls were taken off.

Thief Uses Spyglass To Spot Robbery Chances
TOLEDO, Ore., Sept. 6.—(AP)—A 20-year-old man who sat upon Cape Perpetua with a spyglass and "cased" his car, provings was under a two-year prison sentence today.

Hiller Arthur Hayes, a transient, pleaded guilty in circuit court to breaking into 14 cars, parked at the scenic Devil's Churn near Waldport.

His system, he said, was to watch the approaching cars with field glasses, and notice whether the women carried their purses as they left. If they didn't, he went down and broke into the car.

The purses he buried on Cape Perpetua.

MOVE DISPLACED PERSONS
GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The International Refugee organization will move 18,133 displaced persons to the United States and 12,200 to Australia during September it was announced today. In addition 1,200 refugees will be moved to Canada Sept. 22.

INDIANA, Pa., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Movie Actor Jimmy Stewart took his bride to a country fair and got a top prize—full endorsement of his choice from his father.

Alex Stewart, Jimmy's father, said he was "happy as the dickens" over the actor's marriage to the former Gloria Hatrick McLean, 31.

"She's 100 percent wonderful. She helped make this a perfect homecoming," Alex said.

The couple provided most of the excitement Friday at the Indiana country fair itself.

They munched hotdogs, ate popcorn and talked with Jimmy's boyhood friends. Father Stewart owns a string of harness horses and operates a hardware store here.

The Stewarts motored to Cleveland for the national air races. Then they'll begin a honeymoon in Honolulu.

Business And Pressure Groups Forstal Economy

PORTLAND, Sept. 6.—(AP)—An alliance of businessmen, public pressure groups and government bureaus is forestalling any economy in government.

That accusation came from Senator Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) here Friday in a speech before the Oregon Association of Insurance Agents.

Every time a budget cut is proposed for some government bureau, both the bureau and the public pressure groups begin protesting, the senator said.

He called for an end to excise taxes, which "throttle incentive," and insisted that military spending could be more economical if such unification measures as centralized procurement were adopted.

Gypsy Tradition Halts Seattle Couple's Romance

SEATTLE, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Gypsy tradition has interfered with a Seattle couple's romance.

Lloyd Richard Martin, 29, an aircraft worker, said he wanted to marry 16-year-old Emilia George, a Gypsy girl.

The girl's father, Miller George, who brought his family from Los Angeles to a trailer camp here a week ago, said tribal rules forbid a girl to marry outside her group. Besides, he told officers, she is too young to know her own mind.

Meanwhile, Martin was charged to contributing to the delinquency of a minor. The complaint was made by the father after the couple had gone away together. Martin said the girl told him she was 20 years old. She listed her

Russian Troops Invade Iran, Iraq, Douglas Reports

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Every two or three weeks Russian troops invade Iraq and Iran, says Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas.

He said in an interview the Moscow radio had attacked his recent mountain climbing trip in the Middle East because of fear that an American might "find out what is going on."

Douglas said a Russian patrol, or company or battalion pushes 40 or 50 miles into Iraq or Iran until it meets another patrol. Then there are a few shots and the invaders withdraw, he added.

Asked if there were any pitched battles, he replied that there were not.

"But there is shooting," he said, "and a few men are killed every week. It is just part of the war of nerves."

Douglas said he had not witnessed any of such encounters on his trip but that they were common knowledge there.

His trip resulted in a Moscow cry of "spy." Douglas previously had labeled the Moscow reaction as nonsense.

The justice said his trip was purely personal—a present to his 17-year-old son, Bill Jr.

He added that the Moscow radio, while they were there, "called me the big devil and my son the little devil. It pleased him mightily."

Douglas spoke before the northern California division of the United World Federalists of America last night.

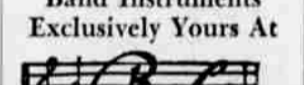
