**CZECH HENS LAY MORE EGGS**  
PRAGUE—(AP)—The government statistical service reports that Czechoslovakia's hens are doing better for the nation—increasing their egg laying average.  
This rose to 13.3 eggs per hen in June and the over-all egg production rose 25.4 per cent for the first half of 1949. A further contributing factor was an increase of nearly three million in the number of hens.

## Petrillo's Feud With Actors Is Mushrooming

NEW YORK—(AP)—James C. Petrillo's feud with a vaudeville artists' union has mushroomed into a battle with the big 90,000-member AFL Association Actors and Artists of America.

A showdown fight between Petrillo's AFL Federation of Musicians and the AAAA parent body of all performer groups could have wide repercussions in the nation's entertainment industry.

Paul Dulzell, AAAA president, said yesterday his group was in "unanimous defiance" of Petrillo's threatened action against the American Guild of Variety Artists, an AAAA branch composed mostly of vaudeville actors.

"Traditionally actors have always gotten along well with musicians," Dulzell said, "but if Mr. Petrillo wants to start a fight which will involve the entire entertainment field, he can have it by taking action against any of the branches of the four A's."

The statement was in reply to Petrillo's threat last week to pull orchestras out of the nation's night spots and theaters where AGVA members perform. He accused the vaudeville artists union of raiding his musician's union.

Petrillo claimed some musicians had been forced to join AGVA because their work required them to deliver a few spoken lines.

## OSC Grad Gets \$1000 Weyerhaeuser Fellowship

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Robert H. Ruth, '43 graduate in forestry here has been awarded the first \$1,000 forestry fellowship recently announced by the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

Paul M. Dunn, dean of forestry, has just announced. The grant is for a research fellowship to be known as the "Weyerhaeuser Fellowship in Forest Management."

Immediately after his graduation Ruth joined the navy and served until 1946. Since 1947 he has been a forester in the department of forest management research in the Pacific Northwest Forest experiment station in charge of the Cascade Head experimental forest near Otis.

His fellowship is effective September 1.

In establishing fellowships here and at University of Washington, the company said they are intended to provide opportunity for capable young men to continue their studies in forest management, who can later help meet the industry's need for scientific leadership in this field.

## Steel Spans In Pavilion At OSC Of Record Length

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Steel roof supports in the new Gill pavilion are of near record size and are probably the largest that has gone into postwar construction, according to G. W. Holcomb, professor of structural engineering here, who has reported on unusual aspects of the 10,000 seat structure in a recent issue of Engineering News Record.

The 12 rigid riveted steel frames weigh 60 tons each, are above the playing floor, permitting elimination of all interior

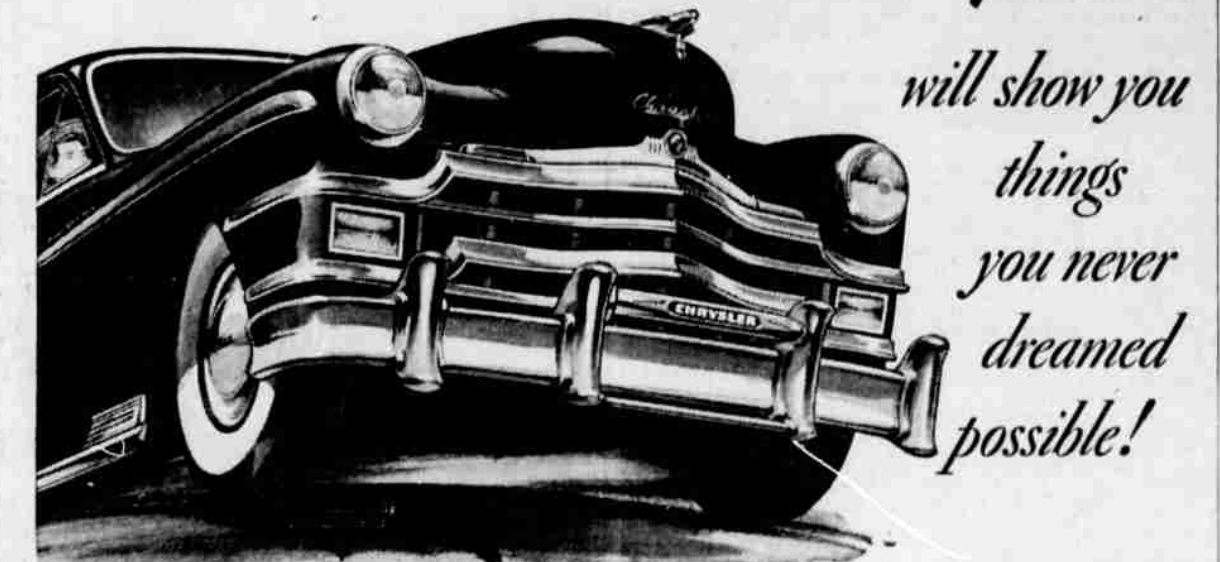
