Dog Control Law Is Explained By City Manager

City Manager M. W. Siankard today issued an explanation of the dog control laws under which

the city is now operating its new municipal dog pound, under state law and city ordinance. "Confusion in the minds of many persons is created over the stipulation that dogs must not be permitted to run at large even

stipulation that dogs must not be permitted to run at large even though they are licensed." Slankard said.

"If dogs are creating a nuisance, that is, if they are running at large, through yards and after cars, they will be picked up and lodged in the municipal dog pound, whether they are licensed or not," he said.

Complaints are turned in to the city hall regarding the offending dogs and, according to law, the city dog control officers must impound them if it is determined the canines are creating a nuisance.

Slankard urged local dog owners to keep their pets within the confines of their property, otherwise the dogs will be impounded and owners will have to "bail" them out.
