## Dog Control Law Is Explained By City Manager

City Manager M. W. Slankard today issued an explanation of the dog control laws under which the city is now operating its new municipal dog pound, under state law and city ordinance.

"Confusion in the minds of many persons is created over the stipulation that dogs must not be permitted to run at large even though they are licensed," Slankard said.

"If dogs are creating a nuisance, that is, if they are running at large, through yards and after cars, they will be picked up and lodged in the municipal dog pound, whether they are licensed or not," he said.

Complaints are turned in to the city hall regarding the offending dogs and, according to law, the city dog control officers must impound them if it is determined the canines are creating a nuisance.

Slankard urged local dog owners to keep their pets within the confines of their property, otherwise the dogs will be impounded and owners will have to "hail" them out.

Roseburg's two dog control officers, who began work Sept. 1, are Elbert W. Nans and Kenneth F. Calhoun, both of Roseburg.

**Famed Pianist To Appear Here With Gale Page**

An internationally famous pianist and composer who has been hailed by music lovers and musicians as Leopold Stokowski, Bing Crosby and James Melton will appear at Junior high school Saturday, Sept. 17, at 8:15 p.m., in a popular concert with Gale Page. He is Count Aldo Solito de Solis.

Solito's compositions are heralded as outstanding contributions to modern music. Leopold Stokowski introduced his "Portrait of Spain" to an enthusiastic audience at the Hollywood bowl. This recognition alone indicates the fine quality of the compositions of Solito de Solis.

Solis was introduced to American radio audiences by Bing Crosby, who suggested that this talented pianist-composer give a concert treatment to popular music, which is essentially American. The results were his sparkling concert paraphrases of "Star Dust," "Swanee River," "Stormy Weather," "Summer Time," and the incomparable concert arrangement of "Night and Day." All of these, along with "Portraits of Spain," and other well chosen presentations will make up Solito de Solis' concert program.

Deems Taylor, considered the greatest music critic in America, labeled Solito de Solis as an "exceptionally talented pianist," after his Carnegie hall concert.

His career as a concert pianist began at the age of four and his first professional tour was behind him before his ninth birthday. Solis has had triumphal concerts throughout the world and has appeared as guest soloist with such conductors as Fritz Busch, Sir Henry Wood, Albert Coates, Mikish, and Steinback. London newspapers claimed that no other concert pianist since Paderewski has caused an after-concert ovation.
