Singing Soviets Hit Low Note

MOSCOW—A Soviet newspaper reports the dire results of the attempt at an enterprising club director in a small Russian city to convert a song and dance ensemble into a soccer football team.

The song and dance ensemble of the Central Home of Culture of the Railroad Workers, according to the paper, had been giving concerts in the town of Bul in Kostroma District without any particular financial success.

So the directors of the club told the group that their concert season was over. However, he offered to pay them for playing soccer if they would organize a team. He would arrange the games he said.

The director's plan was simple. The initials of the ensemble are TsDKZh and the initials of one of the most famous soccer teams in the USSR are TsDK. He posted signs all over town advising the forthcoming game between the singers' turned footballers and a local team, but had on the end of the name of the team was so small it was hardly noticeable.

Thousands of soccer fans turned out under the impression they were to see the champions of the Soviet Union play the local eleven.

The results of the game were sad. The team of singers were a little rusty since most of them had not played soccer for years. When the local eleven had kicked 15 goals into the singers' net before the first half was well underway, it was decided to call off the match.

The director and the players collected public scorn as well as quite a bit of money.

The paper, which headed its account of the story "A Tenor Off-side," declared they deserved the former but hardly the latter.

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Hawaiian Dock Strike Talks Are Being Pushed

NEW YORK, Sept. 12—(AP)—Federal Mediation Chief Cyrus S. Ching today stepped up the pace of peace talks in the 135-day-old Hawaiian dock strike.

There was no indication, however, that a settlement was near. Ching held a brief joint session with representatives of the Hawaiian Employers council and the CIO International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's union.

Less than half an hour later the 73-year-old mediator met separately with the employer group while union President Harry Bridges conferred in another private session with his two aides, I.L.W.U. Washington Representative William Glazier, and Fred T. Low, chairman of the Hawaiian strike committee.

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
