## Russia Steps Up Campaign Against Tito Government

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — (AP) — An important Yugoslav spokesman claimed today Russia has stepped up her campaign against Marshal Tito's government because she wants to block western trade agreements with Yugoslavia.

Vladimir Bakaric, president of the Croatian republic, said Russia seeks to discourage other Soviet satellites from following the same independent line as Tito.

Bakaric, quoted in the official communist newspaper, Borba, said the whole campaign of the Cominform now is designed to create a feeling that Yugoslavia's position is unsafe.

The Croatian leader outlined Yugoslavia's position in a speech at Pazin, on the Istrian peninsula and declared "the present situation does not frighten us."

Bakaric's remarks came as the Tito regime approached the point of concluding a big trade pact with Britain and while an international bank commission continued its inquiry here on Tito's request for a major loan.

Meantime, Yugoslavia has begun prosecution of 11 persons on charges of spying in this country for Hungary.

The trial, another aspect of the war of nerves being waged between Yugoslavia and the communist information bureau, is being held in the Danube city of Novi Sad.

**Government Expects  
Farms On Now Arid Land**

EPHRATA, Wash. — (AP) — The federal government is expecting 1,000 farms on arid lands of the Columbia basin by 1952, William Warne, assistant secretary of the interior said here.

After reviewing the irrigation schedule in a four-day conference with bureau of reclamation officials, Warne said irrigation water would be available by then to 87,000 acres of new land.

He said government expenditures this year on the Columbia basin development would amount to \$200,000 a day. He added the reclamation bureau is working on the development as speedily as could be expected.

Under the schedule, another 71,000 acres would be irrigated by 1953, 77,000 the next year, and 91,000 in 1955. Some 536,000 acres would be irrigated by 1958, enough for 6,700 farms.

**GUilty PLEA ENTERED**  
PENDLETON, Sept. 14 — (AP) — William Edward Swiger, Union, indicted by the grand jury on a charge of assault and robbery with a dangerous weapon, pleaded guilty Tuesday in circuit court.

He was sentenced by Judge Homer L. Watts to five years in the state penitentiary.

The thrice married Gardiner and the once divorced Miss Henie tried to get a license Tuesday, but marriage license clerk George Ahrens turned him down because he lacked his divorce papers.

Gardiner, 36, and Miss Henie, 33, plan to be married tomorrow. A yachting honeymoon will follow.

**Head-On Crash Kills  
Woman, Injures Husband**

CHEHALIS, Sept. 14 — (AP) — A head-on crash between two trucks killed a woman and critically injured her husband south of here Tuesday.

Mrs. Frances Joy Thomas, 28, was dead upon arrival at a Chehalis hospital. Her husband, Charles J. Thomas, suffered multiple fractures, severe shock and possible internal injuries. They were reported moving from their Portland home to Seattle.

**Boy Faces Charge He  
Murdered His Mother**

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Sept. 15 — (AP) — A 14-year-old Shandonale, Ky., school boy faces a murder charge for the shotgun slaying of his mother while she slept.

Sheriff's deputies came here to return the boy, James Pearl Edmiston, to Pikeville, Ky., where a warrant was issued charging him with murder.

He said he was sorry. "I don't know what I was thinking about. I hadn't planned to kill her. I'm sorry now. I wish I hadn't done it."

The statement was made to

newsmen at Cabell County jail.

The boy had been quoted as saying his mother, 34-year-old Mrs. Pearl Edmiston, had beaten him with a poker.

He later changed the story, saying both his father, Pearl Edmiston, and the mother had been good to him.

James is an only child. The father drives a truck for a coal company.

**Judge Rules Bob Hope  
Must Appear in Person**

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15 — (AP) — Bob Hope must make his radio broadcasts in person.

So held a Superior court judge Tuesday in confirming the decision of an arbitrator. Recently the comedian and his sponsors, Lever Bros. Co., disagreed on the issue. Hope wanted to make some transcription shows.

**First All-Negro Jury  
Convicts Man Of Race**

FRANKFORT, Ky., Sept. 15 — (AP) — The first all-Negro jury ever to try a member of its own race here Tuesday convicted George Adams of voluntary manslaughter.

A three-year sentence was recommended for the Negro defendant. Adams was charged with fatally shooting a white man, Ransom Maddox, a World War II veteran.

Adams claimed self defense in the shooting last April 4 in which Maddox's brother, Mitchell Maddox, was wounded.
