Flight Training Offered Veterans Under G. I. Bill

Veterans now may take flight training under the G. I. Bill without necessarily submitting to Veterans administration complete justification that the course will be taken in connection with their present or contemplated business or occupation.

This change in flight training policy is contained in Public Law 266, passed by Congress and signed into law August 24 by the President.

Public Law 266 is the Independent Offices Appropriations Act of 1950, which provides VA's appropriations for the fiscal year which began July 1, 1949.

Instead of complete justification, a veteran planning to take G. I. flight training now may submit to VA (1) a certificate in the form of an affidavit signed by him, and (2) corroborating affidavits by two competent interested persons. The affidavits must show that flight training will be useful to him in connection with earning a livelihood.

In the absence of substantial evidence to the contrary, VA will accept the affidavits as constituting compliance with the law.

Along with affidavits, the veteran also must submit a certificate showing that he is physically qualified for flight training, in accordance with Civil Aeronautics Administration standards, to obtain the type of license that will enable him to attain his employment objective.

Former FBI Agent Tells Of Russian Spies During War

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—(AP)—A former FBI agent testified that several hundred Russian spies were operating in this country during the war but none could be arrested without state department approval.

Larry E. Kerley, a G-man from 1937 to 1935, told a senate judiciary subcommittee that the Soviet government assigned its "best agents" to ferreting for atom-bomb secrets. They were at it long before there was an atom bomb, he added.

The committee is studying a bill to tighten immigration laws against subversive aliens.

Kerley said Russia used members of diplomatic and trade missions, as well as native communists, in the far-flung espionage network.

The FBI, he added, had information on "several hundred" of them. How many more there were, he added, no one knows except the "commintern" representatives who directed the overall activities.

Kerley, now on the editorial staff of the New York Journal American, said the FBI was not permitted to "open up" Russian espionage cases without the state department's approval.

He testified the department gave its approval in some cases. In response to other questions, he said that an order was issued providing that no arrests of Russian agents were to be made without the state department's approval.

He said the order still was in effect when he left the FBI in October, 1945.

Inmates Are Sentenced For Death Of Negro

LÓMPOC, Calif.—(AP)—Four inmates of the U. S. disciplinary barracks at Camp Cooke have been sentenced to death for the knife slaying of a fellow prisoner last June 10.

The four are Richard Sposoff, 21, Clarksville, Pa.; William D. Barnes, 20, Nashville, Tenn.; John Lee, 25, Louisville, Ky.; and Clarence Coons, 30, St. Louis, Mo.

They are charged with attacking and murdering Charles W. Taylor, 31-year-old Negro. The death sentences will be reviewed by the judge advocate and President Truman, the board said.

ACTRESS IS ILL
OLNEY, Md., Sept. 19.—(AP)—Actress Helen Hayes, appearing at Olney theater in "Good Housekeeping," is ill with influenza. The four remaining performances of the show were cancelled.

Schools Must Be Fair With Vet Tuition Rates

Schools must negotiate fair and reasonable tuition rates with Veterans Administration when they have no "customary" cost of tuition, before they may accept veteran-enrollees at government expense under the G. I. Bill, VA announced.

This provision is contained in Public Law 266, the Independent Offices Appropriations Act of 1950, which became effective August 24, furnishing VA's appropriations for the fiscal year which began this July 1.

The Act states that where an institution has no "customary cost of tuition" according to the definition of the term incorporated in the law—VA may not pay a veteran's subsistence or the school's tuition and other charges, until a "fair and reasonable" rate of payment for tuition, fees and other charges has been determined.

A school's customary charge, the law says, is "that charge which an educational or training institution requires a non-veteran enrollee similarly circumstanced to pay as and for tuition for a course."

Lighted Match Discovery Averts Fire At Stadium

By discovering a burning cigaret under the grandstands at the high school football game Friday night, firemen averted a blaze which could have been serious.

Assistant Fire Chief Tony Shukle said a spectator dropped his cigaret through a crack. He informed an usher, who in turn notified firemen, who located and extinguished the fire which had been ignited in a storage room.

Shukle said the cigaret dropped into a pile of pasteboard cartons and had started to burn. "If that man had not had sense enough to notice his cigaret was still burning when he dropped it, we might have had a really serious fire," Shukle commented.

He added that hereafter there must be no smoking in the grandstands. Firemen and a truck will be stationed at Finlay field during each game to guard against recurrence of such fires.

Friday evening firemen put out a furnace fire which caused smoke damage at a house at 809 S. Kane street, Shukle also reported.

Truman Denies McCarran Has Approval Of U. S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—(AP) President Truman said that Chairman McCarran (D-New) of the Senate Judiciary committee is acting on his own in going to Spain to talk with Generalissimo Franco about diplomatic recognition by the United States.

McCarran said that he would visit Franco not only to discuss diplomatic recognition but to talk over the possibility of a loan to Spain.

Mr. Truman said McCarran is not representing this government in any way, and has no authority to commit the United States to anything.

He is representing nobody in the government of the United States, the President said bluntly.
