MRS. WARG AND MRS. CARD ATTEND BOARD OF MANAGERS MEETING

Mrs. S. A. Warg, Roseburg, and Mrs. Prentiss Card of Sutherlin attended the meeting of the board of managers of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers held in Portland last week. Mrs. Warg is president of the Douglas County P.T.A. Council.

At this meeting the board voted to work for the passage of legislation requiring a minimum of four years of college work and a Bachelor's Degree for regular certification of teachers in the elementary schools. This was part of a four-point objective in a plan of work outlined by Mr. R. E. Lieuallen, School Education Chairman for the Congress. The three other objectives proposed were: the passage of the referendum to increase basic school support from \$30 to \$80 per census child, maintenance of salary levels in general with additional increases for teachers with long experience and much training, and continuation of the scholarship program.

The Congress felt that many parents are not aware of the school bus law passed last spring which provides that all vehicles moving on a two-lane highway must stop when a school bus is stopped for the purpose of loading or unloading children or when children are crossing the roadway. On a four-lane highway vehicles going in the same direction must come to a halt. Wishing to see this law enforced throughout the state, the Congress moved that the Secretary of State's office be requested to install permanent road signs so that people will know the law is in existence.
