Coast Guard stations in Oregon. The union, which said it repre-sented crews of more than 120 fishing vessels, said the Coast Guard lifeboat stations at Port Orford. Bandon, and Florence are needed for fishermen's safety. A particular plea was made for the Port Orford station, contend-ing that when other ports are closed by heavy seas, Coast Guard boats can often be launched from Port Orford for rescue work. "To close this station," the union said, "would be to deny Oregon's most rugged and dan-gerous coast line any dependable Coast Guard service. The closure was proposed as an economy measure.
