Welfare Grants Pruned By State Of Washington

OLYMPIA, Wash., Sept. 27.—Cuts in Washington state public welfare grants ranging from 12 to 50 per cent effective Nov. 1 were announced Monday by State Social Security Director Roderic Olzendam.

In an order sent to all county welfare administrators, Olzendam directed that grants to persons covered by the aid to dependent children program be cut 12 per cent.

General assistance payments to unemployable persons—recently cut 20 per cent effective Oct. 1—was sliced 35 per cent beginning Nov. 1.

Assistance grants to employable persons without jobs were cut 50 per cent beginning Nov. 1 when many such persons, excluded from any payments during the summer months, will be back on the general assistance rolls.

No reduction will be applied at this time against grants received by persons receiving old age pensions or aid to the blind, the order said.

The cuts were necessary, Olzendam said in a prepared statement released by his office, to stay within money appropriated for welfare purposes by the last legislature.

Olzendam's assistant, William Moore, said the additional cuts in general assistance were required because expenditures have exceeded the average monthly amount of money available and "with winter coming and job opportunities being fewer, it will be necessary to extend assistance to the employable group . . . who have not received grants during the summer months."

Ultimatum Given
Olzendam's statement said the legislature told the social security department, in effect, "you spend not more than \$206,280,000 of taxpayers' money for relief for two years."

The superior court of Whatcom county and the supreme court, he asserted, have backed "solidly the determination of this department to live within the budget set by the legislature and within the available revenue."

Expenditures thus far, he said, have been exceeding the average of \$171,000 a month provided for general assistance.

"Now the department must act decisively, and at once, to balance the budget," he declared. "We have no other alternative. There is nothing we can do about it except obey the orders of the legislature which the courts have supported."

"It is too bad that a lot of deserving people on relief will have to live on a little less money each month. But, that is the way it is. There just isn't money enough."

Sanitary Election Dated In West Roseburg Area

Al Rowe, chairman of the unofficial West Roseburg Sanitary committee, reminded West Roseburg residents of the election scheduled Thursday, Oct. 6, when creation of a sanitary district will be decided.

The election will be between 8 a. m. and 8 p. m. at the Free Methodist church, corner of Umpqua and Harvard avenues. Persons must be registered voters to participate, he said.
