Arms Aid O.K. Permits Start On War Stock Export

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(AP)—A \$5,809,990,000 appropriation for foreign economic aid won House approval Thursday and was sent to the Senate. It was approved by a voice vote. The new fund is part of a dual program to build up anti-communist nations economically and militarily. The first part, a \$1,314,010,000 arms program for friendly nations, cleared Congress Wednesday and is now in President Truman's hands. It gives him authority to start big stocks of war equipment on the way to the North Atlantic allies. The measure makes immediately available \$125,000,000 in cash from the Reconstruction Finance corporation to throw the arms plan into gear. Senate leaders say these funds can be used to process and ship

Missing Italian Fliers Sighted Adrift On Raft

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—(AP)—TWA announced today it had received a dispatch from its Paris office indicating two Italian fliers, missing since Sept. 17 in a trans-Atlantic flight, were adrift in their plane near the Bahamas islands. The fliers, John M. Brondello and Camillo Barrioglio, were on a planned non-stop flight from the Azores to New York in a single-engine plane. The U. S. Coast Guard said an army plane already had left San Juan, Puerto Rico, for the location given—a point due east of the middle section of the Bahamas group.

Another Grange Scores State Master Tompkins

MEDFORD, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Another grange added its name Thursday to those protesting agal at State Grange Master Morton Tompkins. The Jacksonville grange No. 700 condemned the proposed purge of 22 state legislators, and joined with the Josephine county grange in nominating Victor Boehl, Grants Pass, as State Grange master. The grangers declared that the state convention's proposal to purge legislators who voted for a bill limiting the initiative and referendum was "contrary to the principles of the Grange and promoted pressure politics."

Church Women To Meet

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The Oregon Council of Church Women will hold its fall board meeting in Salem, Oct. 6. The council will also hold special seminars in Salem, Oct. 4-5, and in Medford Oct. 6-7, with several national officials attending.

Boat Blast Kills Boy, Father Is Injured

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—An 18-year-old boy perished and his father and another man were hurt in the explosion of a fishing boat at a moorage here Thursday. Edward Arthur McGrath Jr., Portland, was knocked into the water. Rescuers pulled him out, but he was dead on arrival at a hospital. Timothy David Lake, Depoe bay, said the sports fishing boat Jincro blew up when he tried to start the motor. Lake's leg was broken in the accident. Edward Arthur McGrath Sr. was burned on his hands and face. The Jincro, which was at Weatherlund moorage near Jantzen beach, was preparing to go to Depoe bay.
