Help Handicapped Week to Open in Nation Monday

Civic organizations throughout Roseburg are joining forces to help qualified handicapped workers find jobs during this year's National Employ The Physically Handicapped week, Oct. 2 - 8. Chairman Bill Livemore, announced today.

In the state, Livemore said, are many handicapped workers who want to work and who, if fitted to the proper jobs, can produce as efficiently as unimpaired workers.

"Employers will find these selected workers capable of holding their own on the job," Livemore said. "If properly placed, workers with physical handicaps will relieve local communities and the state and federal governments of the cost of caring for them."

"We are not asking employers to hire physically disabled workers for jobs in which they are not fully as qualified as other workers. We ask only that the employer hire the worker with physical impairments just as he hires other workers — on the basis of ability to do the job. One of the principles of the Oregon State Employment Service is to refer to employers only workers who are fully qualified for jobs that need to be filled."

"The best way to reduce the problem of the handicapped in Roseburg and throughout the nation is to work aggressively to get every physically impaired person into a gainful job he is fitted to do."

Livemore said that this year's campaign would emphasize that "ability, not disability" should be considered in employing physically disabled workers.

Two test bombs were set off at Bikini Atoll on June 30 and July 25, 1946, and three more at Eniwetok in April and May of 1948. Exact date and location of latest atom blast is still undetermined, but evidence signifies Russia's possession of vital A-bomb data.
