Air Force Ring Identifies Flier in Forest Crash

From the scattered wreckage of a light plane which crashed into Red Butte two-and-a-half years ago, state police Monday recovered the skeleton of 22-year-old Douglas C. Locke of Arcadia, Calif.

The wreckage was discovered Saturday by a Portland hunter, Harry Turnbull, who reported it to state police here Sunday. He had been hunting with a party of friends on the Umpqua National forest, where he once had been a lookout.

State Police Sgt. Lyle H. Harrell said Locke's air force ring was found in the burned-out cockpit of the plane and his wrist watch, stopped at 10:20, also was recovered.

The spot where the wreckage was found is about 40 miles east of Roseburg. Red Butte is almost exactly a mile high. Its summit is about three miles southeast of the end of the Little River road which extends into the forest southeast of Glide.

Sgt. Harrell said the plane was found at 4,800 feet elevation, and apparently was headed in a southeasterly direction at the time of the crash. Motors of the plane is intact. Both wings tips of the plane were scattered.

Locke was last heard from Feb. 16, 1947, when he radioed the control tower at Eugene. It was believed he was lost. He was ferrying the plane, a Navion, from Los Angeles to a dealer in Seattle.

After state police recovered the remains of Locke's skeleton Monday, they turned these over to the Roseburg funeral home. Relatives today made arrangements to fly the remains by the California Hearse service to Rose Hill Memorial park, Whittier, Calif., for interment.

Locke was born Nov. 29, 1924. He was a commercial pilot. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Locke live at Arcadia, Calif. Also surviving are three brothers, Walter R. Locke, Monrovia, Calif.; James H. Locke, U. S. Army overseas, and Neal Locke, Boulder, Col.

Fair Competition Assurance Given American Lumber

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The Economic Cooperation administration plans no change in its policy of insisting the United States lumber industry be afforded a chance to compete for business made possible with ECA dollars.

Paul Hoffman, administration head, so informed Rep. Mack (R-Wash) in reply to a request from the congressman.

Mack wrote Hoffman that Washington state lumber manufacturers and producers were concerned over an announcement by the State department that more latitude would be allowed the United Kingdom in purchases made with ECA dollars after the British devalued the pound.

Mack wrote Hoffman that change in the previously announced policy to insist American producers be given a chance to bid on purchases made with ECA dollars would greatly harm the nation's lumber and plywood industry.

There is no change contemplated in the policy whereby the United States lumber industry is afforded an opportunity to compete for lumber products where dollars are used to purchase the commodity," Hoffman replied.

Canada Increases Tariff On Prunes And Pears

OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Canada has raised her tariff wall against imported prunes and pears—two items of the fruits and vegetables category on which the dominion removed import controls Saturday.

Decontrol means a greater influx of United States fresh fruits and vegetables. However, the increase in tariff may slow shipments of United States pears and prunes.

Both items bear a 10 per cent duty, but the value for duty has been increased by one-half cent a pound on pears and three-fifths of a cent a pound on prunes.

Both increases are within the terms of the Geneva trade pact which specifies that tariffs may not be more than a cent a pound on such commodities.

Now's The Time For Oyster Dishes

Oysters are back in season and that means steaming oysters, stews, lots of oyster cocktails and fried oysters with tartare sauce.

You can buy them live in the shell, fresh shucked or frozen shucked. There are also canned oysters. Today, with modern refrigeration, oysters can be shipped thousands of miles safely.

Oyster Stew (Serves 6) — One pint oysters, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 quart milk, 1-2 teaspoons salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, paprika.

Melt butter, add drained oysters, and cook 3 minutes or until edges curl. Add milk, salt and pepper and bring almost to boiling point. Serve at once. Garnish with paprika.

Oyster Cocktail (Serves 6) — One and one-half pints oysters, lettuce, cocktail sauce, lemon wedges.

Drain and dry oysters. Allow six oysters for each serving and arrange in lettuce cups on individual salad plates. In the center of each plate place a small cone of watercress biscuits.
