

Movie Scheduled At Garden Valley

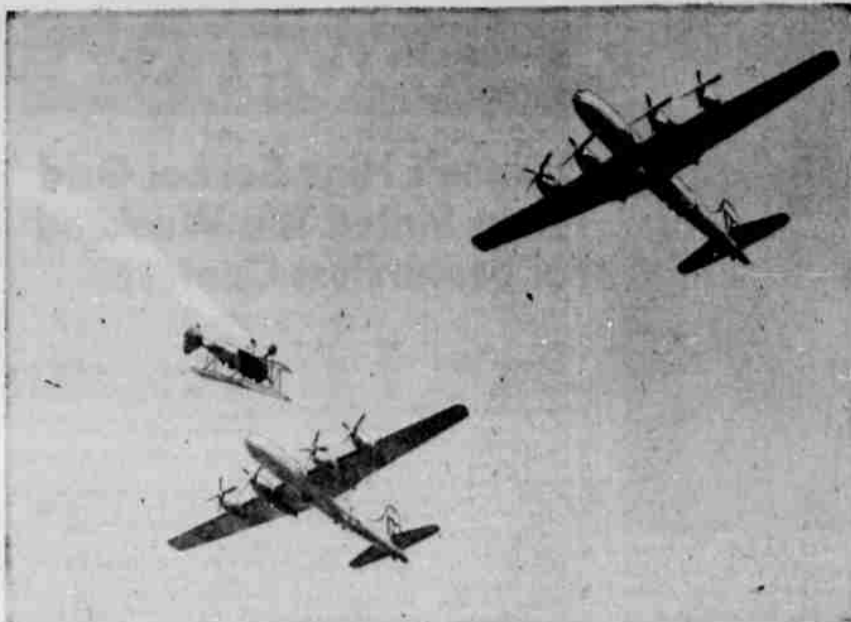
The showing of a special motion picture, entitled "Salt of the Earth," is scheduled by the Garden Valley Sunday school Sunday at 2:30 p.m. in the Women's Community club building.

Low Cost Public Housing On Fair Basis Discussed

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(P)—A Portland architect said Thursday that low cost public housing could be built here without causing undue competition or disrupting private building.

Glenn Stanton told a regional

convention of Pacific Northwest housing officials that the people who would use public housing would not be able, in any case, to buy privately-built homes.

Stanton estimated that the 2,000 low-cost housing units proposed for Portland would cost about twice the \$3,260 that each unit on the war-built Columbia Villa project did.

He explained that such public housing, since it is financed by 40-year federal loan and must last for all those 40 years, has to be built more sturdily than speculative houses intended for brief use.

Stanton spoke before the regional convention of the National Association of Housing Officials, which opened a two-day session Thursday.

Rodeo Performer Faces Portland Hold-Up Charge

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(P)—A 22-year-old rodeo performer was charged today with holding up an east side restaurant to pay the rent for his girl friend's mother.

The 15-year-old girl friend was turned over to juvenile authorities. The man, James Emil Richardson, was held under \$3,000 bail. Police said the girl had a gun when the two were arrested.

The mother, Mrs. Antonio Boffa, whose revolver was identified as carried by Richardson, denied knowing anything about it. Told by policewomen her daughter had been arrested, she said:

"Maybe it's a good lesson," Detective Ray Duerst quoted Richardson as saying he robbed Eldridge's restaurant of \$61 last night to provide money for Mrs. Boffa to pay her hotel room rent and buy food.

The detective said Richardson told this story:

He returned from the rodeo circuit to find his girl friend and her mother in financial difficulties.

He borrowed Mrs. Boffa's revolver, loaded it—over her protests—and last night set out with Constable for a likely spot. They walked along 82nd Avenue until they found a small restaurant with only three people inside.

They ordered coffee, then Richardson pulled out his gun, ordered J. W. Eldridge and his two employees into the kitchen, and departed with \$61 from the cash register.

Richardson and the young girl were arrested shortly afterward by police who had heard a broadcast description of the pair.

New Bids Called For State Office Building

SALEM, Oct. 7.—(P)—The State Highway commission announced today it would open bids November 7 on the proposed Highway Office building to be constructed in Salem.

Previous bids were rejected as too high. The commission hopes to build the building for about \$1,600,000.

The commission also called for bids on providing ferry service across Coos river at Enegren crossing in Coos county. The bids will be opened November 7. The service is for the two-year period beginning next January 6. The state provided the ferry boat, which operates 20 hours daily.

The Capitol Building in Washington, D. C., is 751 feet long and 350 feet wide, including the approaches.
