Fire Prevention Week Proclaimed By Mayor Flegel

Mayor Albert G. Flegel has proclaimed the week of Oct. 9-15 as Fire Prevention week in Roseburg, to be observed locally in connection with the national observance of the week.

A single afternoon or evening will be enough time to rid your home of the most common fire hazards, Fire Chief William "Dutch" Mills said today in urging local citizens to join in the nationwide observance.

"The first step is to clean out the cellar," the chief said. "Most families have stacks of old magazines, piles of discarded clothing, and even pieces of furniture stuck away down there."

"All it takes is a spark from the furnace or a defect in the wiring or a carelessly dropped cigarette to start a fire in the cellar. Once it is started, it is particularly difficult to bring under control, if those piles of fast-burning paper, cloth and wood are there to supply fuel."

Reported Strike Of Oil Premature

OCEAN CITY, Wash., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Excitement ran high at the Union Oil company's test well here last night as surface equipment developed a leak, permitting gassy mud to blow, permitting the well casing and a certain amount of natural gas in the well.

The blow lasted for about an hour before repairs could be made, permitting normal testing operations to resume. Al Hilton, petroleum engineer for the company, said the gas in the mud came from two sources: the discharged combustion gas of equipment or "guns" used to perforate the well casing and a certain amount of natural gas in the well.

He was critical of persons he described as "speculators and speculators," who, seeing the blow about 10:30 p. m., dashed to telephones to spread a story of oil without waiting to learn that equipment had developed a leak and some of the gas had come from the equipment, itself.

"We don't know if we've got anything or not," he said. "We are now continuing normal testing operations, swabbing muddy, gassy water from the 1,300-foot level in the upper zone."

The Ocean City well, most favorable of the company's exploratory wells in Washington, already has been tested in the lower and central intermediate zones where no oil and little gas was found. The upper zone, now being tested, had the best showing of the three zones as the well was being drilled.

LIFE IN OLD SALT LAKE

SALT LAKE CITY.—(AP)—The Great Salt Lake is not entirely without life, although it is several times saltier than ocean water. Analyses have shown the salt content to range through the years from less than 13 to about 27 percent. Because of the salt a swimmer cannot sink in the lake. Minute brine shrimp, various larvae, insects and algae live in the water.

Heavy Fall Of Snow Covers Cascade Range

PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Snow piled unseasonably high in the Cascade range today, deposited by a storm that dumped heavy rain elsewhere and unleashed a lightning bolt that knocked out the western section of the Northwest power pool.

Snow plows were sent to all Cascade passes in Oregon. More than a foot was reported on the McKenzie pass. There was at least 18 inches at Timberline lodge on Mt. Hood, and the start of the skiing season was announced there.

A lightning bolt struck a power line yesterday afternoon and knocked out the J. D. Ross and Covington, Wash., substations for the first time in history. Power failures were common through western Oregon and Washington. Service was off in some sections up to 25 minutes.

Chemist Explains Automobile "Goose Pimples"

CAPE GIARARDEAU, Mo., Oct. 8.—(AP)—It's capillary action, that's what it is! At least that's the explanation offered for a sudden epidemic of "goose pimples" on several hundred automobiles in this area.

The theory was offered by Prof. A. C. Magill, head of the chemistry department of the State college here.

Residents of several widely scattered cities were mystified when they discovered that overnight the paint jobs on their cars had developed the goose pimples. Some were tiny, others as big as a dime.

Inside was a drop of water. But the surface of the bubbles was not punctured. What caused these paint pimples and how did the

water get inside through an apparently waterproof surface? That's just it, says Magill. Some paint is porous. (It was noted that cars with enamel finishes were not affected.) The professor believes capillary action on the pores forced water under the paint, causing the bubbles.
