

Suits Asks Money. Title Quieting

The following complaints have been filed in circuit court:

F. E. Fernekorn vs. John D. Kenney. Judgment for \$708.80, alleged due on a promissory note, is asked, together with a lien on a Studebaker automobile of the defendant to cover the judgment.

Credit Bureaus Adjustment Department, Inc., vs. C. L. Deitrick. Plaintiff asks judgment for \$395.67 claimed due on an assigned account.

Percy Armstrong vs. John Pinkerton and Susan A. Throne. Administrator of the estate of John E. Throne. Plaintiff asks judgment for \$350 for survey work he claims he did on the Pinkerton and Throne subdivision.

Each bid must state the amount per thousand feet of board measure, that will be paid for each species, the total consideration which will be paid for the timber and a statement that the bidder will comply with local manufacturing requirements as hereinafter stated. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. Each sealed bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit. The deposit must be in cash or in the form of a certified check on a solvent bank and in favor of the Treasurer of the United States.
