Two cups finely chopped, cooked, cold potatoes, 1-2 cup season. Meli butter in 6-inch frying pan ack in potatoes and cook over very low heat for about 20 minutes or until crusty and brown on the bottom. Fold over like an omelet and turn out on a hot plate.

Four tablespoons butter, 4 ablespoons flour, 1-3 cups evaporated milk, 2 tablespoons unter, salt and pepper to season.
