HALLOWEEN PARTY PLANNED BY GRANGE

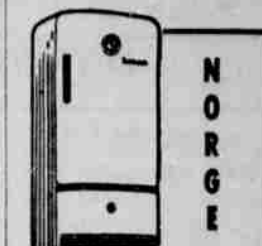
Members of South Deer Creek grange are making plans for a Halloween dance to be held at
