Eagles' Plans For Christmas Spell Joy For Children

Preliminary steps have been taken to promote both projects. Travis said "about a dozen" children have signed already for the Christmas carolers' group but he expressed the hope that at least that many more will sign the application cards available at the Donut Bar on W. Cass street.

Any boy or girl old enough to read and who likes to sing is eligible for the group, Travis said. He said the Eagles plan to have a local music teacher instruct the group in weekly practice sessions. During the week preceding Christmas, the carolers will board a truck and travel throughout the city serenading shut-ins, invalids, Veterans hospital patients, and the local citizenry.

At the same time, Travis said the youngsters will be accompanied by a Santa Claus who will distribute toys gathered and mended by members of the Eagles lodge. The Eagles' Junior club, a group of teenagers, will help gather the broken and worn out toys and will also aid in repairing and painting.

Travis emphasized the need for cooperation from persons who may have old toys, because little time remains in which the group will be able to make repairs. He said it makes no difference how badly broken the toys are, since parts of badly broken toys will be used in rebuilding new toys.

Partisan Dispute Besets Record Of 81st Congress

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 — (AP) — The 81st congress is nearing the end of its first session with its disputed record certain to be a major political issue next year. Its leaders hope to adjourn sometime this week after more than nine months of almost continuous session.

Depending on how you look at it, its record is either very good or very bad. Senate Democratic leader Lucas (Ill.) handed President Truman a report Monday which he said shows "outstanding progress in far reaching progressive legislation" at this session.

Lucas told reporters the report was prepared by the staff of the Senate's democratic policy committee. He added that the President is "happy and pleased at the progress in both houses."

Rep. McCormack (Mass.), democratic leader in the House said that only agreement on the farm bill and on the number of air groups to be financed by the military appropriations measure are needed to permit adjournment Wednesday.

Lucas said one of the first things the senate will do at its next session in January is to pass a bill for expanded social security. The House already has passed such a measure.

Presidential Secretary Charles Ross has described the record of the 81st as "rather remarkable" a summation in which democratic congressional leaders generally concur.

Republicans can't see it that way. Senator Wherry (R-Nebr.) said Congress under the Democrats has been "poorly organized and weakly led." He added that campaign pledges of President Truman had turned out to be empty promises.

Singer Manufacturing Strike Comes To End

ELIZABETH, N. J., Oct. 18. — (AP) — The 168-day-old strike at the Singer Manufacturing Co. had ended.

Between 2,000 and 2,500 of the 7,000 workers who walked out May 2 were scheduled to return to their jobs today. The strikers, members of local 401, United Electrical Workers (CIO), voted at a mass meeting to accept a new general contract providing no general wage increase and retaining the disputed standards or incentive pay system.
