Adverse Ruling On Federal Rent Control Law Will Be Reviewed By Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—(AP)—The supreme court has agreed to review a decision that the 1949 federal rent control act is unconstitutional.

The decision has been held in abeyance pending supreme court action. Handed down by U. S. District Court Judge E. W. R. Shaw in Chicago, the decision was appealed directly to the high tribunal by the Justice department. The department contends Shaw's opinion is erroneous.

The Supreme court will hear arguments on the issue in two weeks, then give its ruling later. The 1949 rent act permits states and municipalities to end rent controls. Shaw declared this an unconstitutional delegation of power by congress, then ruled the entire act invalid. The Justice department's appeal said 14,000,000 housing accommodations remain under rent controls. It added that "the tenants will be left defenseless if the (Shaw) decision should be allowed to stand."

The court, in its third meeting of the new term, again confined its actions to orders with no opinions handed down. Among other things, the tribunal: Refused to rule on whether the contempt conviction of a witness in the Alger Hiss perjury case was properly overturned. William Rosen, 65, of Santa Monica, Calif., was sentenced to six months in jail for refusing to answer questions about a 1929 roadster asked by a federal grand jury in New York City while it had the Hiss case under investigation. Rosen's conviction was overturned by the U. S. circuit court in New York City on the grounds that Rosen properly used his constitutional privilege against self-incrimination.

Women Granted Review
Agreed to review the cases of two women accused of failure to produce records of the joint anti-Fascist refugee committee for use of the house un-American activities committee. The women, Miss Helen R. Bryan and Mrs. Ernestina G. Fleischman, were sentenced to three months' imprisonment and fined \$500 each on charges of contempt of congress. Their convictions were set aside, however, by the U. S. court of appeals here. That court held the questions of whether a majority of the house committee was present at the time of the alleged failure should have been submitted to the trial jury.

In effect reinstated a securities commission complaint charging Otis & Co., Cleveland investment firm, with violating a stock selling contract with the Kaiser-Frazer Corp. The tribunal reversed a decision by the U. S. court of appeals here which had held there was not enough evidence to support charges brought by the SEC.

Refused to review murder trials of two Mississippi men, both under death sentence. The two are William W. Price, convicted of the razor-killing of a child at Grenada, Miss., and Arthur Moore, 16-year-old Negro sentenced for the hammer slaying of J. L. Dean, an insurance man at Jackson, Miss. Both contested the admissibility of asserted confessions as evidence at their trials.

Wife Of Industrialist Killed Under Train
PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Mrs. Ruby Burroughs Batt, 62, wife of the president of SKF Industries, Inc., was killed Monday in a plunge under a Broad street subway train.

William L. Batt, who headed the War Production board during World War Two, identified his wife's severed body at the morgue.

No Settlement Is Seen In Doernbecher Strike
PORTLAND, Oct. 18.—(AP)—No quick settlement appeared in the offing today for the Doernbecher Manufacturing company labor dispute.

The 530 CIO furniture workers at the plant rejected a company proposal yesterday to change provisions in an 11-day-old contract. A spokesman said the changes included "elimination of the premium pay for many workers."

The plant has been closed all but a few hours since Oct. 1. First there was a 2 1/2 day strike. Then after a contract was agreed upon, the company hired back only 125 workers. After the men protested what they said were wage cuts, the company again closed and asked contract changes.

Son Born To GI's Bride On Plane Over The Atlantic

SHANNON AIRPORT, Ireland, Oct. 18.—(AP)—A son was born to a G. I. bride Monday in a crowded passenger plane over the Atlantic ocean.

While the American Overseas Airlines Constellation raced at full throttle for Ireland, Mrs. Darinka Parker, a former inmate of a Nazi concentration camp, gave birth to a four-pound boy, Dr. Fred Herschel, New York, one of the passengers, assisted at the birth.

The plane, with 36 passengers aboard, was 400 miles out of Shannon when the baby arrived. The transport made its regular stop here and the mother and child were taken in an ambulance to a nearby hospital.

In Frankfurt, Master Sergeant James C. Parker had gone to the Rhein-Main airport to meet his wife. A grinning headquarters official met him, instead, and announced: "You're a father, sergeant."

The 40-year-old father, attached to the air force headquarters at Wiesbaden, said he was flooded by the news. He will ask, and probably get, permission to come to Ireland at once. Parker said his wife is a former Yugoslav displaced person. He met her in 1945 on the day she was released from a German prison near Nuernberg. They have been married three years. Sgt. Parker comes from Alderson, W. Va.

The plane was en route from New York to Frankfurt, Germany, by way of Ireland. The 26-year-old mother, a GI bride from Bavaria, was quoted as saying: "I hadn't expected the baby for another month and a half."

Compromise Bills Up Pay Of Civil Service Workers
WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Compromise bills raising the pay of approximately 1,385,000 government workers at an annual cost of \$239,000,000 were passed Monday by the House and sent to the Senate.
The raises for about 885,000 civil service workers would average \$140 each.
Approximately 500,000 postal employees would receive raises of \$120 annually each. They would not, however, get uniform allowances or extra annual leave as originally voted by the House. Employees hired on a temporary or part-time basis would receive percentage raises instead of a flat increase.
Both chambers had passed the bills previously but in different form, necessitating the compromise.
The House also passed and sent to the Senate Monday a bill raising the pay of 138 employees in the postoffice's mail equipment plant at an estimated annual cost of \$14,000.
