Moral Progress Shouldn't Lag, Ministers Told
SEATTLE, Oct. 19. — A gathering of 1,000 Methodist ministers and laymen from throughout the state were urged Tuesday to work towards moral progress comparable to the material and economic gains of the 20's.

The daylong session at the First Methodist church was one of 78 scheduled in major cities of the nation for "the advance of Christ and his church."

Bishop Alexander P. Shaw of Baltimore, Md., told the congregation that:

"Preachers still have the important task of causing a moral progress comparable to material gain. The church has values that the material gains of this time never can surpass."

Bishop Gerald H. Kennedy of Portland said that Methodist churches will be asked to take on additional missionary projects during the coming year.
