He said the commission has \$30,000,000 to start the work at Oak Ridge, Tenn., and Hanford, Wash.

He added that he will not know how much the program will cost until he has an opportunity to talk it over with the commission and the budget bureau, but that he has seen a figure of \$300,000,000 mentioned in the papers.

In a statement he said that the decision to expand the atomic facilities "is the result of careful studies directed toward finding means of increasing our production capacity in an orderly fashion."

been increased to \$330,000. The assessed value of the city has increased to over \$7,323,000. This is part of the reason for the lowering of the city tax rate to 15.6 mills. It is well to note that the budget has been increased \$168,000 and the tax rate has been lowered 4.4 mills.

New Benefits Listed—Streets are being graded and graveled by city crews. Many streets have been resurfaced and painted. New equipment has been bought and the personnel of the street department doubled. A large equipment garage has been constructed. A full time mechanic has been hired to maintain equipment.

Transmitting-receiving radio equipment has been bought for the fire trucks and police cars and motorcycles.

Roseburg boasts 113 modern mercury vapor street lights, costing \$51,000.

A new municipal swimming pool was constructed by city employees at a great saving to the people of Roseburg.

A new park and recreation department has been formed, to provide better recreation facilities. Plans have been approved for a community kitchen and large outdoor fireplace in Umpqua park.

We of Roseburg are proud of the fact that we have secured much needed facilities without increasing taxes. The city of Roseburg is in much better shape to give added facilities to areas becoming part of the city.

Extensions Desired—Roseburg has not stopped with what has been done. We think it desirable to install more street lighting. We think the new modern lighting should go out. ### Beneficiary Perpetuates Student Assistance Plan

LOS ANGELES (AP)—When Francisco Bravo was a young medical student, he worked nights at a gas station and could study only in the intervals between cars. He wondered then if there wasn't some way life could be made easier for ambitious Mexican-Americans of limited means. Now, as Dr. Francisco Bravo, he has found the answer. He helps them himself.

Last year he gave \$10,000 of the earnings of his Bravo clinic to finance a scholarship at the Stanford University School of Medicine for Rodolfo Ponce, of Riverside, Calif. Recently he gave William Diaz, of Riverside, Calif., \$2,000 to cover a four-year course at the School of Pharmacy of the University of Southern California.

Dr. Bravo attached one string to these awards. The young men he befriends must promise to aid other Mexican-Americans who desire professional careers.

on installment credit and bank loans expire in June.

Social Security—Expanded coverage and increased benefits approved by House, but no action in Senate.

National Health Insurance—No action in either chamber. Both houses approved extension of federal aid in hospital construction program.

Education—Plan for federal aid to states passed by Senate, but bottled up in House labor committee.

Repeal Controls—Rejected a request for two-year extension but approved a one-year continuation on a states' right basis whereby curbs can be removed by local action.

Farm Program—Shelved the Brannan plan, and approved a compromise price support program which generally provides for a continuation of wartime prices under major crops.

Defense—Proposal for universal military training ignored. Biggest peacetime appropriation for armed services approved.

Civil Rights—Repeal of poll taxes approved by House, but no action in Senate; anti-lynching legislation approved by Senate committee, and fair employment practices commission approved by House committee.

Pay Raises—Nearly every federal employee from a buck private up to the commander-in-chief himself and including postal workers, civil service employees and top executives were voted salary hikes.

### FOREIGN AFFAIRS

Economic—Second year's installment on Marshall plan aid to Europe approved; reciprocal trade agreements program renewed without restrictions voted by last Congress; international wheat agreement ratified by Senate; export controls extended for two years; plan to aid development of backward areas of world with government-backed private investments not acted on by either House.

building and warehouse will be located approximately one block north of the new City market, on the highway. Final approval of the contract is being awaited from the Rural Electrification administration at Washington, D. C.

When the new office building is completed, the cooperative will vacate its offices in the Pacific building, in downtown Roseburg, said Backen.

The contractors who recently submitted bids for construction of the office building and warehouse include the Nord Construction company of Corvallis, \$63,784.42, and Todd Building company, Roseburg, \$66,850.

Backen said the new substation west of Oakland cost approximately \$25,000 and includes four 667 kva transformers and one regulator, the latter to maintain adequate voltage. The substation has a full load capacity of 2,000 kva.

The new substation is located on the Carlton Goff property. With its completion, and of a 34.5 kv feeder line from the Bonneville Power administration substation at Drain, The Douglas Electric cooperative discontinues its point of delivery from the California Oregon Power company at Oakland.

### Third Diphtheria Death Is Reported At Medford

MEDFORD, Oct. 20. (AP)—Medford's third diphtheria death was reported today.

A 12-year-old boy, one of the first stricken in the present outbreak, succumbed to the disease Wednesday night.

No new cases occurred, however, and health officials expressed hope that the disease was under control. Virtually all the grade school pupils in the county have been immunized.

There have been 11 cases, including three fatal, so far.


