

Weekend Grid Games Slated At Finlay Field

Although the Roseburg Indians will absorb most of the football limelight this weekend, other Roseburg football teams will also battle on the turf in weekend contests.

Cece Sherwood's varsity Indians oppose Cottage Grove varsity in a non-league tilt at Finlay field Friday night, with the kickoff slated for 8 o'clock.

A feature during halftime will see the grade school "heavies" clash in an exhibition scrimmage. Boys from Rose, Fullerton, Benson and Riverside grade schools will participate.

Saturday, the grade school teams will collide in regular league games. The "heavies" of Benson will oppose Rose graders, while Fullerton "heavies" play Riverside. Grade school Peewees will also joust in the Saturday morning scramble at Finlay field. Rose and Fullerton will battle it out and Benson opposes Riverside.

The grade school footballers play the width of the Finlay field gridiron, rather than the length. Game time is 9:30 a.m.

Malheur Refuge Area To Be Opened To Hunters

PORTLAND, Oct. 20.—(AP)—An 8,000-acre public shooting ground will be available to migratory waterfowl hunters this year in the northeast part of Malheur Lake.

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife service, reporting the opening of part of the Malheur national wild life refuge to hunters, said the area open this year is different from that of last season. It said a checking station will be operated at the entry point eight miles southeast of Lawen, and motor ists driving from Burns should take the Burns-Crane highway to approximately four miles east of Lawen.

Leo L. Laythe, regional director, said the area "should provide some good shooting for a limited number of hunters."

Race Tax Boosts Welfare Of Quail

SACRAMENTO, (AP)—The California quail, after a century of being hunted by palefaces and having his cover, food supply and watering places taken by same, is about to enter the welfare state. The California paleface likes to bet on horses, and his state levies a tax thereon which is applied to game conservation.

Some \$375,000 of this is to be used during the next three years to build watering devices, feeding grounds, and brush shelters for California quail. The federal government, under the Pittman-Robertson act, will almost double the ante with another \$640,000.

California has been working on this for some time, and already has 500 automatic "quail qualiferias" working. They are concrete cisterns that catch rain during the wet season and dole it out through the dry months when millions of baby quail would otherwise die of thirst.

Signs Warn Deer About Menace Of Motorists

QUINCY, Calif.—(AP)—Could be that H. O. Williams of the Plumas County Chamber of Commerce is a cynic. In this deer country the usual highway sign reads: "Drive slowly—Deer Crossing."

Williams has put signs along a dozen roads that read: "Deer keep off highway—motorists passing."

UCLA And Bears Figured To Win Saturday Games

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—(AP)—California's Bears and the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins, co-leaders of the Pacific Coast conference, each figure to win another football game Saturday.

Off comparative performances, only the biggest kind of an upset could oust California to lose to Washington, four times beaten—twice in the conference. California is the league's only undefeated, untied team in all 1949 games.

The U.C.L.A. assignment may be a bit tougher. The Bruins travel to Pullman to meet Washington State. Inclement weather could prove a leveling agent. Although it technically fronts the conference race with three wins, U.C.L.A.'s bubble of invincibility was pricked last week when it was blanked 0-1 by the strong Independent Santa Clara.

Three other contenders, each with one league defeat, will be battling to stay in the race. They are Oregon, Southern California and Stanford.

The red hot contest of the week will bring Oregon and Southern California together in Los Angeles. Oregon's one loss occurred on its previous visit to the south—a 35-27 setback by U.C.L.A. U.S.C. dropped a 16-10 decision to California.

Stanford, also a game off the conference pace, entertains an improved Oregon State team.

Coach Red Sanders looked over the squad and listed Julie Weinstein of Jim Buchanan at quarter, Ernie Johnson and Howard Hansen or Bob Watson at the halves and Cliff Schroeder ready to roll at fullback. Sanders juggles his backfield for offensive and defensive purposes.
