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Trio Accused Of Murder, Although Cop Did Killing

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Three men must face trial on charges of murder, robbery and kidnaping in an attempted hold-up of a Hollywood boulevard shoe store in which a clerk was slain by a policeman's bullets.

Although a coroner's jury ruled that a policeman fired the shot which killed Sidney Gilbert, 49, formerly of Fort Worth, Tex., the trio will face charges for his slaying. Another man, Alexander E. White, 44, was wounded in the gun battle.

Under California law, participants of an armed robbery involving a fatality are deemed guilty of murder, no matter who fired the shot.

Police testified they found Ralph Briney, 42, Glendale, Calif.; Delmar G. Foster, 26, Wichita, Kans., and Floyd E. Fish, 22, Burbank, Calif., armed and hiding in the store.

Officers said the three had herded eight employes and a customer into a stock room and forced them to lie on the floor.

A coroner's jury found Gilbert's death "excusable homicide" and held that the bullet came from a policeman's gun.

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Stone Artifacts Of Early Oregon Indians Found

LEBANON —(AP)—Willamette university scientists and students are planning further excavations northeast of here where stone artifacts have been found in a pit near several earth mounds.

Dr. John A. Rademaker and Prof. W. Herman Clark of the university have examined the implements and tools. Dr. Rademaker has conducted students and others to the site in the past week.

The Oregon Statesman of Salem, in a copyrighted story, said Dr. Rademaker believed the stones were part of "a medicine man's outfit for ceremonials."

Prof. Clark was quoted as saying the artifacts were "beautifully formed" of soft shale rock. They appeared to have been ground and polished instead of being chipped. The scientists said the

home. William Hunt, an amateur rock collector here, chanced to see them. An Oregon Statesman reporter later learned of their existence and interested the Willamette scientists.

The site is about 14 miles north-east of here on a lofty Cascade ridge overlooking Roaring river.

Bus And Tractor-Trailer Crash; 1 Dead, 21 Injured

PAOLI, Pa., Oct. 25.—(AP)—A Greyhound bus and a tractor trailer loaded with 33,000 pounds of steel collided a mile and a half west of here Monday killing one person and injuring 31 others.

State police identified the dead man as Stephen H. Chapley Jr., 18-year-old sailor who was returning to the cruiser Ramonoke from his home in Uniontown, Pa.

The trailer, laden with sheet steel, cut through the right front side of the bus, pinning several passengers in their seats.

State Police Take-Over Of Sheriffs' Work Spurned.

PORTLAND, Oct. 26.—(AP)—A proposal that county sheriff give up police work to the state police has been rejected by the Multnomah county tax conservation board.

Board Chairman M. L. Bingham released a 3,200-word report on tax supervision and conservation studies.

The report took a dim view of the proposal by State Senator Austin Flegel, made in the last legislature, that state police could better do the work now performed by the sheriffs.

"Local control of police authority is extremely important because abuses of power and authority and otherwise poor police service, if existent, can be much more easily corrected at the local level than at the state level," the report stated.
