Almost twenty-six million radio homes in the United States had set tuned in to the 1949 World Series broadcasts carried exclusively over the Mutual-Don Lee Broadcasting system under the sponsorship of the Gillette Safety Razor company, Oct. 5-9. This figure is the highest ever recorded in World Series broadcast history. The Network Research department, in conjunction with radio listener specialists of Crossley, Inc., have determined that 65.1% of all radio homes in the country were tuned in to the Mel Allen-Red Barber descriptions over the coast-to-coast Mutual Network during one or more of the five playing days, with an average rating of 37.9 for the five games. The peak listener interest was reached during the final game on Sunday, Oct. 9, when 54.6% of the nation's radio homes were tuned to the baseball classic. The Crossley survey was made in the same cities and with the same technique as that which has been used for these special studies for Mutual for the past eleven years.

Northwest Log Shipments In September Decrease

SEATTLE—(AP)—Log shipment in the Pacific Northwest in September decreased sharply from the September totals of the past three years, but loadings of lumber and forest products continued at a high level.
The Pacific Northwest Advisory board included those highlights in its monthly report. It covers railroad car loadings in Oregon, Washington and northern Idaho.
Secretary F. T. Westmeyer said the log loadings dropped because of large inventories on hand. The September log total was 21,020 cars, compared with 34,538 and 28,745 in the two preceding Septembers.
Loadings of lumber and forest products totaled 41,266 cars for the month, compared with 40,002 a year ago and 31,356 in September, 1947.
The year's eight-month total for lumber and forest products, 270,526, however, was below last year's 305,977 for the same period and the previous year's 283,787.

600 Coal-Burning Trains Forced To Cease Operation

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The nation's railroad passenger service was sharply curtailed Wednesday as some 600 coal-burning trains were sidetracked because of the coal strike.
The trains were canceled, in compliance with an Interstate Commerce commission order to conserve coal during the strike. Most of the trains canceled are secondary, short runs between towns or suburban service.
All coal-burning carriers, with less than a 25-day supply, were ordered to reduce passenger service by 25 percent. Unless rescinded, the order is to be effective for two months.
The coal strike, now in its 28th day, showed no signs of early settlement.
The New York Central canceled 146 trains and the Pennsylvania cut off 103.
Much of the train service west of the Mississippi river was unaffected. Ironically, in this territory where miners are still digging coal, all but a very small fraction of passenger train service is supplied by diesel power.

Halloween Muddled Cider Made With Many Spices

For use as a Halloween party treat, here's the recipe for hot muddled cider.
You will need: 1 gallon cider; 1 cup sugar; 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice; 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon; 1 teaspoon whole cloves; and 1 eight inch cinnamon stick.
Directions for making: Tie the spices in small cloth bag about 6 inches square. Add sugar, spice bag and cinnamon stick to cider. Heat 20 minutes at a temperature below boiling. Lengthen or shorten cooking time to suit your taste since spicy flavors increase with longer cooking.
Serve hot in tea cups or punch cups.

SWAP CONSIDERED

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Secretary of State Acheson has indicated the United States is considering swapping 1,000,000 tons of American wheat for Indian manganese and mica.
The secretary said this is one of several proposals being discussed by the State department and Indian officials as a result of Prime Minister Nehru's visit.

Trade Unions, Builders Renew Wage Contracts

PORTLAND—(AP)—Building trades unions and general contractors of Oregon and southwest Washington have renewed existing wage and working contracts for 1950.
The agreement covers carpenters, laborers and iron workers' unions on projects of the associated general contractors.
A joint union-employer announcement said journeymen carpenter hourly pay is \$2.10, structural and ornamental iron workers \$2.30 and reinforcing and rod men \$2.10, and laborers \$1.70.
The present contract expires Dec. 31.

CIO Asks Removal Of NLRB Counsel Denham

CLEVELAND, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The CIO Wednesday asked for the removal of Robert N. Denham as general counsel of the National Labor Relations board.
CIO President Philip Murray asked President Truman to oust the Chief enforcement officer for the NLRB because, he said, Denham had overstepped permissible bounds of discretion in administering his office.
"He has utilized his vast powers to aid employers bent on destroying free trade unions," Murray said in a statement in advance of the CIO's annual convention.

U. S. To "Get Tough" With Marshall Plan Nations

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Paul G. Hoffman headed for Europe Wednesday reportedly armed with an ultimatum to Marshall plan countries that they speed up their recovery progress—or else.
Persons who should know said Hoffman has ready some "get tough" proposals which would tell Western Europe, in effect: "Show more self-help among yourselves and more determination to achieve recovery—or else risk loss of sharp cutbacks of multi-billion dollar aid now flowing to Europe under the Marshall plan."
Secretary of State Acheson and Hoffman held a closed-door conference Tuesday on recommendations Hoffman will carry to Paris to lay before the 19 Marshall plan countries when they meet next week.
