Toastmistresses Listen To Talks Of Top Interest

Plans to attend a toastmistress meeting in Eugene Sunday, Oct. 30, were made at the Roseburg Toastmistress club session Tuesday night at Carl's Haven. Several local members will take part.

Reasons brought out included helping civic projects, creating more interest in politics, self betterment and making new friends.

Mrs. Thomas Martin and Mrs. Jack Myers, giving their first speeches, each gave autobiographical sketches. Mrs. Martin told of her early childhood and education at Aberdeen, Wash. She discussed the town's history, concerning lumber development, Japanese boats, and fishing on the North river.

Mrs. Myers said she was born in Chicago, and grew up there, being graduated from the University of Chicago. After her marriage she moved to Tulsa, Okla., Washington, D. C., Alaska, and Bakersfield, Calif. where her husband was engaged in submarine geology study. They currently operate a hunting and fishing lodge on the North Umpqua.

Mrs. Dimick told the story of her grandfather, a Mormon settler of Utah. She related events in the settlement's history and the transforming of the desert to fertile grounds by irrigation. She told also of the early lives of the Mormons and their families. Her grandfather died at the age of 96.

Mrs. Jones spoke of her father, "one of 13 red-headed sons." His love for adventure caused him to run away and join a circus for four years. He settled later in the California oil fields, and drove a 16-mile team across the desert. He was later a railroad fireman, but finally returned to the out-of-doors, acquiring a small farm.

As guest speaker for the event, State Senator Austin F. Flegel of Multnomah county will be on hand to assist in bringing the Democrats into a more prominent position in Douglas county politics, it was announced.

Sen. Flegel, brother of Mayor Albert G. Flegel of Roseburg, has been a practicing attorney since 1912 in Oregon. During the late war he temporarily deserted the legal profession to head the ship-building firm of Willamette Iron and Steel corporation in Portland.

Presiding at the rally will be the Douglas county Democratic party chairman, Mrs. Christine Mielcil.
