Communist Says Soviets Will Release Germans

Berlin — (AP) — Communist President Wilhelm Pieck of the East German republic announced today that the Soviet union has promised to return all German war prisoners by next Jan. 1.

He told an East Berlin opera house rally of 1,600 former prisoners that "we have no reason to doubt this definite word."

The communist leader did not estimate how many Germans were still in Russian captivity but he asserted western claims that at least 1,000,000 Germans were missing in Russia were greatly exaggerated.

San. Cordon On Way Home For Deserved Rest

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(AP)—After devoting most of his time since last January to appropriation bills, Senator Cordon (R-Ore) looks forward to hunting geese and fishing for salmon in his home state.

A member of seven Senate Appropriations subcommittees, Cordon says he has more money bills than any other member of the Senate. And he prides himself that he attended every session of the Senate this year.

He is a member of the Appropriations subcommittees on agriculture, Armed Services, deficiencies, Army Civil functions, independent offices, Interior department and Treasury-Postoffice. He is the ranking Republican on the latter group.

Day in and day out during most of the session he sat with subcommittees hearing requests for funds.

He left today for his home at Roseburg. Later he will go to the Klamath Falls area to hunt geese.

"But," he said, "I never did like to eat geese."

He plans to fish for salmon and will visit Depoe Bay and Newport, Oregon, where he has secured funds for constructing a refuge harbor at Depoe Bay at Cordon's insistence. He succeeded in getting the money included in the Army Civil functions bill.

Cordon, who loves to hunt and fish, got out a few weekends during the recent session. But he doesn't care much for the trout fishing he has done. And when he went hunting in Virginia, "it always was the wrong day."

In the early part of December the Senator may go to Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands for the Senate Interior committee.

Prosecutor Sets Out To Trace Ex-Banker's Life

SEATTLE — (AP) — Prosecutor Charles O. Carroll has set out to fill in a 14-year blank in the life of a confessed embezzler who refuses to say where he has been.

Allan Paul Hull, former Seattle banker wanted since 1935 on a charge of embezzling \$8,500, returned to Seattle and gave himself up Friday. The money was taken from the former Tower Savings bank of which he was vice president.

Carroll said Hull told him only that he had made a new start in another community under the name of P. H. Allen. The prosecutor said, however, that Hull indicated he had been working as a commission salesman of some kind. He registered at a Seattle hotel as being from Minneapolis.

"The law requires me to make a recommendation on what sort of a sentence Hull should be given," Carroll said. "I cannot make such a recommendation unless I know where he has been, what he was doing and how he got the \$8,500 he says he has."

But the prosecutor added Hull said he would take the full penitentiary sentence rather than reveal his secret.

Hull's wife divorced him in 1937 and took custody of their two children. She said yesterday she would sue immediately for some \$7,000 in back alimony and support payments assertedly due her.

Cow With Study Window In Side Lives Easy Life

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 31.—(AP)—Don't talk about goldfish in Peephole bossie, a local cow with built-in video. Compared with her, fish in a bowl live a life of seclusion.

For two years people have been snooping through a hole in her stomach to see what goes on inside a cow. Only in the winter does this veterinary school specimen get any privacy. In the cold months she wears a rubber plug in her side to keep the drafts out.

Dr. Ernest C. Stone, chairman of the department of veterinary physiology and pharmacology at Washington State college, cut the eight by three inch peephole in the cow's rumen (stomach number one) two years ago so his students could get a first-hand view of a cow's inner life.

Despite her public interior, bossie, age eight, is a normal, contented cow. Dr. Stone said. She eats well and last spring gave birth to a very healthy calf. Her life expectancy is the same as that of any well cared for Bovine, he said.

Some 200 students have had a squint at bossie's insides as they studied the rumen of a cow, what gases and other products are formed in this first of the four-stomach animal.

The hole is located high on her side, in the hollow of the flank behind the ribs.

She also serves in the research of Dr. Paul Klavans, assistant professor of veterinary physiology.
