Congressman Declines Post in State Dept.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Rep. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont) Monday turned down President Truman's offer to appoint him as an assistant secretary of state in charge of the department's information service.

Mansfield was asked to succeed George V. Allen as head of the "Voice of America" and other department cultural and informational programs. Allen has been named ambassador to Yugoslavia. Mansfield announced at the White House that he had decided "with deep regret" that he could not take the job. He said he felt his first duty was to remain in Congress.
