Here's "Natural" For Cheap Meal

For a low-cost food combina-
tion packed with nutritional val-
ues and sheer eating pleasure,
look to sauerkraut and frankfur-
ters.

Krautfurter Cheese Bake

(Serves 4)

Three cups sauerkraut, 1 1/2 tea-
spoon caraway seeds, 6 frank-
furters, 1 1/2 cups shredded sharp
cheese.

Combine sauerkraut and car-

away seeds. Place half of the
sauerkraut in the bottom of a
greased casserole. Cut frankfur-
ters in half lengthwise. Arrange
half of the frankfurters on top of
sauerkraut and sprinkle with half
the cheese. Repeat layers. Bake
in a moderate oven (350 degrees
F.) 25 to 30 minutes.

Sauerkraut, Potato and

Frankfurters

(Serves 4)

Two cups sauerkraut, 1 1/2 cup

sauerkraut juice, 2 tablespoons

grated onion, 2 tablespoons but-
ter or fortified margarine, 1 cup

finely grated potatoes (raw), 4 to

8 frankfurters.

Combine sauerkraut, juice, on-

ion, 1 tablespoon butter or mar-
garine and grated potatoes in a
saucepan. Cook over moderate
heat stirring frequently until po-
tatoes are cooked. Cut frankfur-
ters part way through on one side
in parallel cuts about 1/4 inch
apart. Saute in remaining butter
until golden brown. Frankfurters
will curl as they cook; so if two
frankfurters are served with
each serving of sauerkraut, place
the frankfurters so that they
form a ring about the sauerkraut.

Kraut and Frankfurter

Vegetable Creole

(Serves 6)

Eight frankfurters, a table-
spoon butter or fortified mar-
garine, two 11-ounce cans vegeta-
ble soup (condensed), 1/2 cup wa-
ter, 4 cups sauerkraut.

Slice frankfurters into 1/4-inch
pieces. Saute in butter or mar-
garine until golden brown. Add
vegetable soup and water. Cook
until thoroughly hot and blend-
ed. Meanwhile heat sauerkraut
over low heat, stirring occasion-
ally. When both sauerkraut and
frankfurter mixtures are hot,
serve frankfurter mixture over
mounds of kraut.
