**Auto Driver Must Have Clear Vision At Least 500 Ft.**

Arrival of winter weather with frequent morning and evening fogs prompted a reminder to motorists from Superintendent of State Police H. G. Malson that Oregon law requires automobile headlights to be turned on in day-time whenever a driver cannot see clearly for at least 500 feet.

He said many motorists think they are observing the law by switching on their parking lights when encountering fog or mist during daylight hours. This practice may stem from earlier days when batteries were conserved as much as possible, but the slight difference in current consumption is a negligible factor in modern cars and the smaller lights do little to reduce the collision danger, he declared.

"The law calls for headlights under such atmospheric conditions, not parking lights," Malson pointed out. "Using headlights on the lower beam will minimize back-reflection into the driver's eyes and greatly improve his chance of being seen in time to avoid colliding with another car or pedestrian."

Many drivers neglect this important safety precaution because their lights do not improve their vision in daylight fog, forgetting that headlights are visible to other drivers or walkers long before the car itself can be seen. Motorists who do not remember the law may expect to be reminded by police officers, the superintendent indicated.

**Harbor Sinking At Los Angeles Creates Problem**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A 12-square mile area on the Los Angeles-Long Beach, Calif., harbor is sinking two inches every month, endangering \$500,000,000 worth of property, a Naval officer says.

The land has dropped more than nine feet since 1937, Comdr. Lewis C. Cox, public works officer of the Long Beach Naval shipyard, told the Waterways Division of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Cox said that earth dikes have been thrown up to protect industrial establishments affected by the dropping of the land and money has been appropriated for concrete walls to protect the Naval shipyard, which has \$100,000,000 worth of equipment.

Removal of oil and gas from the Wilmington oil field is blamed for the subsidence, Cox said. Engineers and geologists estimate the subsidence may reach 18 to 23 feet by 1963 unless methods can be found to stop or retard it.

One plan under study is to reduce rate of oil and gas removal so that groundwater would have time to trickle through to replace them—at levels of 3,500 to 7,000 feet—and the other is to pump water under high pressure into the oil zones to replace the oil and gas.
