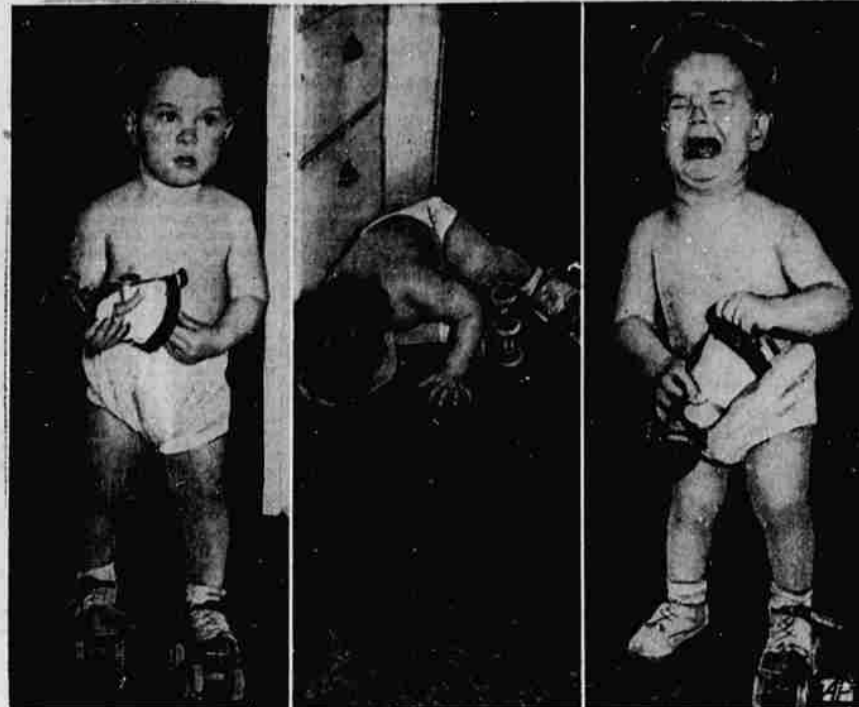
FRIENDLY HOUR CLUB PLANS BAZAAR, NOV. 18
