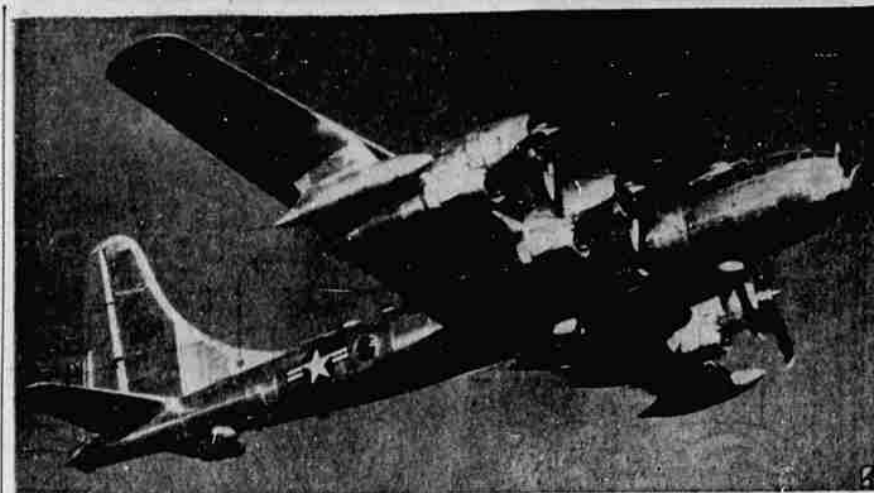

Congressmen Go To Europe To Study DP Operation

NEW YORK — (AP) — A subcommittee of the house appropriations committee has sailed for a survey of state department foreign service and displaced persons operations.

Rep. John J. Rooney (D.-N. Y.), head of the group, said the legislators will spend a month in Ger-

many, Sweden, Denmark, France, England and Italy.

He said their study will include economic cooperation administration appropriations and Voice of America broadcasts.

Rooney said the committee is interested in the handling of visas in Italian cities.

"I understand," he said, "that it takes five to six months to get an appointment to ask a three-minute question."

The group included Lowell Stockman (R.-Ore.).

For a summer menu serve fish filets baked in cream, snap beans and mushrooms, baked sweet potato, a green salad, and fresh plum cake. 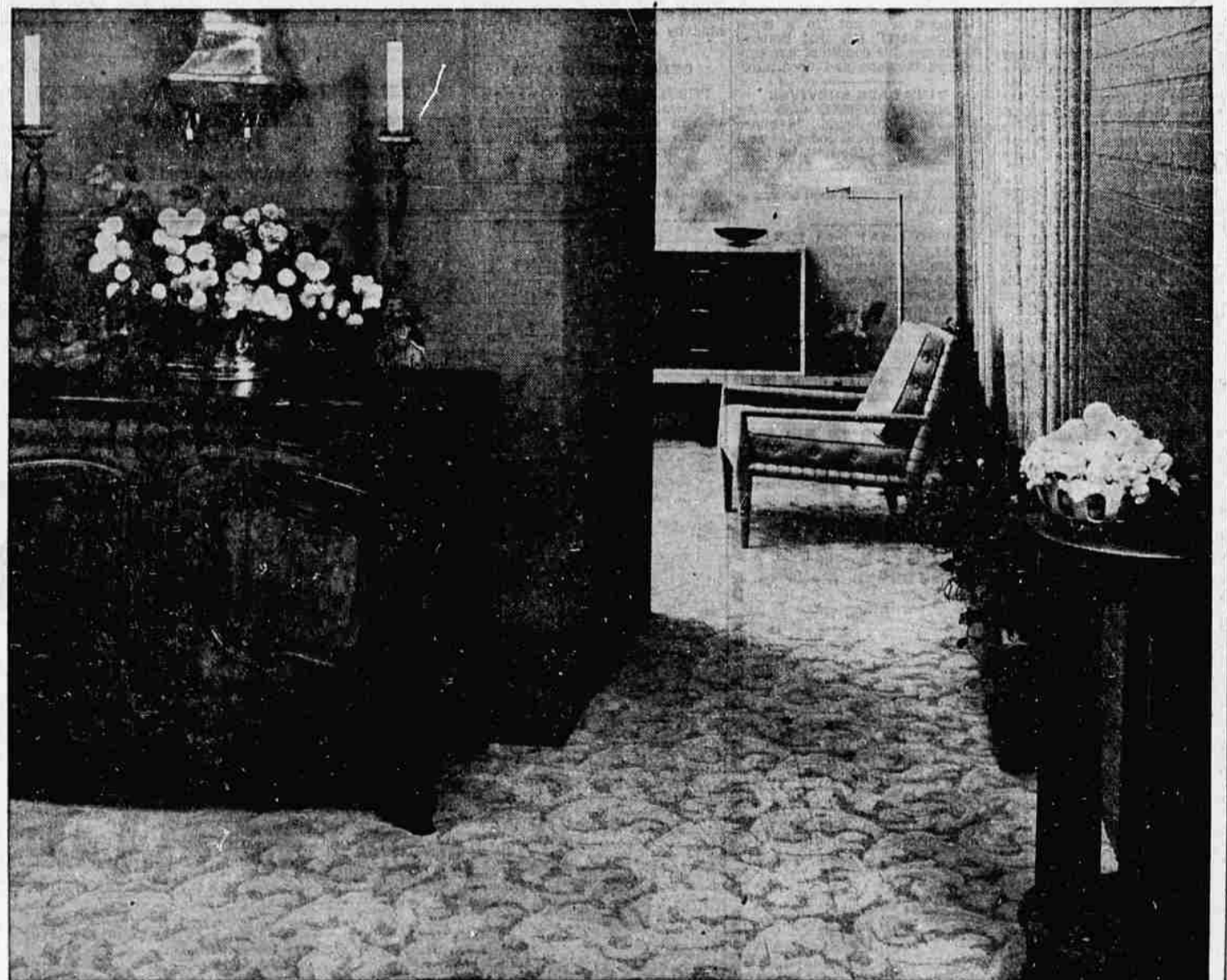
