

Magazine Sale Of Junior High Posts All-Time Record

The recently completed Junior high school magazine subscription drive has again gone over the top—with the highest total ever this year, reports R. E. Brand, school principal.

Students topped all previous efforts by turning in a total of \$7,500 worth of subscriptions. Net profit to the Junior high school is about \$2,200, after deducting campaign and prize expenses.

A total of \$751 was turned in by Advisor Al Hoffman's group of seventh graders, home room 303. The winning group was closely followed by eighth grade home room 307.

Began 13 Years Ago
Thirteen years ago, the Junior high school started its first subscription drive. Purpose of the campaign was to earn extra money to carry on such money-losing student body activities as the school's athletic program. However, the youngsters also had another purpose in mind—to buy extra items for the school, items that were not included in the budget.

A few of the purchases made over the years include two movie projectors and screens, stage curtains and drapes, an electric scoreboard for the gymnasium and a sound system complete with a central transmitter and speaker in every room.

Since their first efforts, when students turned in \$600, the total has gradually increased until this year's \$7,500 total exceeds the high for last year by \$1,000. A year ago, Roseburg Junior high school students sold more subscriptions than any other school west of the Rockies. Brand expects the honor to be repeated this year.

Leaders To Be Honored
Thursday, Dec. 1, the school's top salesmen will be honored at a theater party, sponsored by the school. Included at the special event will be the seventh grad-

ers, winners of the home room sales contest, all youngsters who sold over \$50 worth of subscriptions, and high sellers from other home rooms.

The 65 young salesmen who topped the \$30 mark will receive certificates of achievement from the Curtis Publishing company, sponsors of the local subscription campaigns. In addition, names of the 132 youngsters who sold over \$20 worth have been inscribed on a special school honor roll.

Brand said there has been no provision made as to how the \$2,200 profit will be spent this year. He said the student council will decide upon a project at a later date.

Extensions For Entire Tax Ends

SALEM, Nov. 18.—(AP)—The State Tax commission announced today it is going to require partial payment of taxes when extensions of time are granted for payment of corporation and personal income taxes.

The deadline for filing returns is April 15. Under the old system, if you got an extension of time, all you had to pay was interest.

Now, if you get an extension up to three months, you will have to pay at least 25 percent of your tax. And if the extension is from three to six months, you'll have to pay half of the tax. These partial payments will be due at the time the extension is granted.

No extensions of more than six months will be given.

Truman Assures "Worst" Is Over

BOSTON, Nov. 18.—(AP)—President Truman told New England businessmen Thursday he felt the country was "through the worst part of the adjustment that had to come after the L-100 boom we experienced last year."

But the president advised that the federal government still was "keeping a careful watch on business conditions."

"We have not been lulled into a sense of false security," he said in a message to a joint conference of New England businessmen and governors of the six states.

Mr. Truman urged them to use "boldness and imagination" in meeting the region's problems. "For a time last summer," the president said, "we were deeply concerned over signs of a downturn in business conditions in some of your most important industries. It is very pleasant to know that employment in the textile and shoe industries and some of the other non-durable goods industries has increased considerably and that the general outlook is now favorable."
