W.C.T.U. HAS INTERESTING PROGRAM MEETING WEDNESDAY

In commemoration of the 75th year of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and by special request of the state president, Mrs. Toozie, the Roseburg W.C.T.U. held a special program meeting with the regular session Wednesday afternoon at the Friendship room in the Christian church.

The prayer service, opened by Mrs. C. L. Smith reading the 12th chapter of Roman's, offered prayers for the many notable women of the past, who have so much of their lives in the work of the organization, and for the future women workers of the W.C.T.U.

Mrs. Fred L. Southwick outlined the work of the past and told of the efforts of women down through the last two centuries in fighting alcohol. The first effort, "The Temperance Reformation," took place in the 18th century. An article by Senator Hoar of Massachusetts telling of alcohol and its effects on men remembered by him during his boyhood, is reported to have done much good to bring the matter to the attention of the general public. First temperance literature was the paper, "National Philanthropist," edited by William Lloyd Garrison. In 1837, a handful of women in Hillsboro, Ohio, went into the saloons to pray for the closing of such establishments. This new movement was the beginning of the W.C.T.U., which soon was organized in 18 states and within a decade was organized in every state in the Union as well as many lands. Today the W.C.T.U. is organized in 50 different countries.

Mrs. Southwick stressed the Youth Temperance week and education in the church schools. Mrs. Kenneth W. Knox played two piano solos, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," and "Ere You Left Your Room This Morning." Mrs. J. E. Pinkerton reported a chapter of the study book, "It is smarter not to drink."

Mrs. Edith S. Ackert presented a talk on styles and fashions of the last 60 years. Mrs. Southwick, dressed as Anna Gordon, a noted W.C.T.U. leader of the past, took part in the fashion show and was assisted by five other members of the organization.
