Atomic Energy For Industry Use Slowed By Threat

SEATTLE—(AP)—Sen. McMahon
(D-Conn.) said here development
of atomic power for industrial
and commercial use would
"spurt ahead" if atomic weapons
were outlawed.

McMahon, chairman of the
joint Congressional Atomic En-
ergy committee spoke before an
open meeting sponsored by the
King County Central Democratic
committee.

The Connecticut senator ad-
ded, however, that the United
States must keep its stockpile of
atomic bombs until Russia
agrees "to a realistic system of
international atomic control."

McMahon said there appeared
little hope for such an agreement
because it would mean an end to
the Iron Curtain.

"Atomic energy control is the
heart of the question of peace,"
the senator said. "There can be
no stability or peace in the world
as long as there is an atomic
race between Russia and the
United States."

McMahon said he personally
is convinced the Russians are
making atomic bombs. He asser-
ted the United States would be
much more vulnerable to an
atomic weapon attack than Rus-
sia because of the large concen-
tration of population and indus-

Two Pairs Of Siamese Twins Thriving, Report

LOS ANGELES, — (AP)—Sia-
mese twin girls born here six
months ago, are "doing all
right," general hospital reported.

The babies weighed about 11
pounds together at birth and now
weight 19 pounds, four ounces.
They are joined at the top of
their heads and lie in nearly op-
posite directions in a crib. A
hospital spokesman said they will
stay there indefinitely because
home care would be an almost
impossible task for the mother,
Mrs. John Jones, a Negro who
has seven other children.

Dr. Phoebus Berman, medical
director of the hospital, said it
is felt surgery would be to dra-
stic, at least while the babies are
infants.

TOFIELD, Alta., — (CP)—Sia- mese twin girls, born to Mrs. Bud Townsend, 20, in the Tofield Municipal hospital were report- ed to be "doing fine."

The babies, weighing a total
of nine pounds 12 ounces, were
born Nov. 17.

Mr. Townsend, 22-year-old
clerk, said the children are united
at the abdomen in front but
otherwise are "perfectly devel-
oped."

He said it was hard to say yet
whether any attempt would be
made to separate them.

Jackson County Trapper Found Dead Near Cabin

MEDFORD — (AP)—An elderly
trapper, who had apparently
emptied his gun in a vain at-
tempt to summon help, was found
dead a mile and a half from his
isolated cabin.

A search party came upon the
body of Frank Ortmann, 64, a dis-
abled veteran of the first World
War, in the steamboat area of
the Applegate valley.

He was first missed Nov. 12,
and a search was started a week
later.

Coroner Carlos Morris said the
elderly man had fallen dead,
probably from a heart attack,
after firing three shots from his
gun.

ted 12-year-old George Crick of

a charge of murdering four-year-
old Stanley Graves.

testified the Crick boy pushed the
younger child and caused him to
fall into the water. The boy's
lawyer contended it was an acci-
dental death.
