Noted Violinist Dated in Opener Of Concert Series

Ricardo Odnoposoff, violinist, will present the opening program of the Roseburg Community Concert association series for 1949-50, from the stage of the junior high school Wednesday night. The program will start at 8:15 p. m.

Hailed as a master of the violin, Odnoposoff began his studies in his native Argentina with a pupil of Leopold Auer. At the age of 12, the boy virtuoso was taken from Buenos Aires to Berlin, where he started under the tutelage of the master teacher, Carl Flesch.

While still a student, Odnoposoff received an unprecedented honor. He was chosen as soloist of the Berlin Philharmonic by conductor Erik Hiebert, recognition never before accorded a not-yet-graduated artist. The student created a sensation, and has been engaged in triumph ever since.

In 1932 Odnoposoff won first prize in the international contest in Vienna and embarked upon an overwhelmingly successful tour of his native South America. Europe recalled him and held him for many years.

In 1937 he won the violinist's highest award—state prize in the Brussels, Belgium, "Concours International Ysaye." Spectacular successes throughout Europe and South America preceded his Carnegie hall debut in 1942.

Odnoposoff's concert here Wednesday will be open to members of the Roseburg Community Concert association and to visiting members of Community Concert associations of other cities.

Thanksgiving Has Approval Of Pope

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 28.—(AP) Pope Pius XII today suggested universal observance of America's traditional Thanksgiving day. He told a group of visiting American congressmen: "Our heart is touched and comforted by this recurring evidence—and would that it were universal—of one of the very first charges linked to the mission of responsible statesmanship."

The congressmen included Lowell Stockman (R-Ore). The Pope reminded the legislators that to a program as well as a proclamation. "This program, he added, 'must imply a sensitiveness, a delicate and determined adjustment of mind and heart to the divine, as well as to the merely human rights and interests that press for recognition and protection... especially during these critical days of reconstruction in the sector of international economy and finance.'"

"Thanks be, then, first and last to God," the Pope declared.

SUICIDE FOLLOWS ERROR
PEMBROKE, Ga. (AP)—A Thanksgiving day turkey hunter committed suicide after he apparently had mistaken a red kerchief for a cock's comb and killed his aunt.

The dead were identified by Sheriff E. W. Miles as Mrs. Bertha Goodman, 35, and William E. Ruff, 29, both of Savannah. Sheriff Miles said Mrs. Goodman was wearing a red kerchief when she and Ruff took stands about 30 paces apart for the shoot.

Apparently, said Miles, Ruff spotted Mrs. Goodman's red kerchief bobbing in the thick brush along the Ogeechee river and fired.

New York Gives Bojangles Bill Notable Funeral

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Harlem and Broadway, who loved him long and well, will give a last salute today to Bill (Bojangles) Robinson.

Mayor William O'Dwyer, an honorary pallbearer, will head a two-mile funeral procession through Harlem when the 71-year-old Negro dancer's body is carried from an armory to a church for services.

Then a cortege of automobiles will escort Bojangles downtown to Duffy square—just north of Times square—for a Broadway farewell in song.

Bojangles' old friend, Noble Sissle, will lead a group of massed "name" bands. Broadway notables will participate.

From there the cortege will go to Brooklyn, where the veteran performer will be buried in the actors' section of Evergreen cemetery.

Today, more of Bojangles' Harlem neighbors and downtown friends headed for the armory, where his body lay in state until 11:30 a. m.

Visitors at the armory totaled 31,942, police said shortly after the building closed at 11 p. m. last night. At one time, there was a line of 5,000 standing in light snow and cold wind to pay their respects to the dancer who died Friday night of heart trouble.

There were old folks with canes, children led by the hand, and many a babe in arms among those in the procession past the flag-draped casket. Two policemen from Bojangles' home precinct stood hour guard at his head and feet.

There were many flowers, de-

mitted his request that they be omitted and the money be sent to his favorite charities.

Floral offerings bore cards from Duke Ellington, Joe Louis, Lena Horne, Bob Hope, Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll (Amos 'n' Andy) and other performers. One was from a locally "mayor," M. Thornton of Beale street, Memphis, a birthplace of jazz.

The funeral procession, with bands of music and marching children, will proceed from the armory to the Abyssinian Baptist church in Harlem. The Rev. Adam Clayton Powell Jr., Negro congressman and husband of singer Hazel Scott, will conduct services.

Opera, stage and concert stars will participate in the rites. Harlem school children will be given a half holiday to pay respect to their idol, who never forgot them while he was tap dancing and smiling his way into the hearts of millions and making and getting rid of a fortune of about \$3,000,000.
