

## San Francisco Football Players Call Off Strike

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The San Francisco 49ers pro football squad called off a threatened strike today.

A team spokesman said the 32 players decided their obligation to fans who want to see them play the New York Yankees here Sunday was more important than their demand for a \$500 bonus per player for the game. Sunday's affair is a semi-final play-off in the All America conference.

Earlier team Captain Norman Standlee, 245 pound fullback and onetime Stanford great, and halfback Len Eshmont, former Fordham flash, speaking as "elder spokesmen" said the men wouldn't show up for the game unless they were promised the bonus.

Tony Morabito, one of the club owners, said nothing doing. He told the 49ers to turn out for practice this morning or the season would be over as far as they were concerned.

The squad of 32 went into a huddle last night. They came out of it at midnight with the announcement there would be no strike. Their spokesman handed out a statement saying:

"It is the unanimous decision of the team that our first and most important loyalty is to the fans who have supported us so loyally. We feel the same obligation to the coaching staff."

"The business principle which brought about the difference . . . If secondary in the hearts of the team as compared to our obligation to our fans."

"We therefore have decided to enter next Sunday's contest with a most determined will to win. We still feel our principle involved in requesting remuneration for next Sunday's game was most fair and sound, since all of us were under the impression at the time we signed our 1949

contracts that compensation for this game would be forthcoming."

The 49ers won second place last Sunday in final all America conference standings by beating

the Yankees 35-14 in a bruising game. The Yanks wound up third and the two teams are scheduled to open the playoff here.

## Jamboree in 1950 Beckons Scouts Of Douglas Troops

"The biggest thing ever in scouting." That was the way Scout Executive Rollie Quam referred to the Boy Scouts of America's jamboree, scheduled next June 20 to July 6 at Valley Forge, Penn.

Each troop in Douglas district will be eligible to send at least one boy to the jamboree. In addition three outstanding scouts in the district will be selected to accompany the contingent of boys from this area as scoutmaster and two assistants.

The cost will be \$300 for each boy. A registration fee of \$25 must be in by Dec. 20. It is not necessary that the boy be selected from the troop by that time, so long as the registration fee is submitted.

Plans for Boy Scouts from this area to attend were made at a recent meeting in Eugene. Among the members of the council jamboree committee is Bruce Elliott of Roseburg.

At this meeting the scouts were told by Max B. Jensen, scout executive of the Oregon Trail Area council, that approximately one boy from each scout unit in the council would make the three-week trip. It was pointed out that the high spot of this scouting experience would be the week-long encampment at Valley Forge of boys from all over the United States and foreign countries. The scouts attending from the Pacific Northwest will have lots of opportunities to see natural and man-made points of interest on the way to and from the encampment.

## Baseball Craze Snaps Jap Newspaper Policy

TKYO.—(AP)—Asahi, one of Japan's largest newspapers with a combined morning and afternoon circulation of 3,500,000 has bowed to popular demand and begun publishing professional baseball news.

Heretofore only the bare results of professional games were published. And this in a country where people are as crazy about baseball as they are in the United States.

One editor explained it this way: Several years ago Asahi pioneered in sponsoring amateur baseball tournaments. To the average Japanese reader that meant Asahi was committed to amateur sports. If Asahi published professional baseball news readers would suspect his paper of sponsoring an amateur tournament only to get players for the professionals.

So Asahi, until now, stuck to amateur sports news.

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## Drastic Coffee Shortage Unlikely

PULLMAN, Wash.—(AP)—The current high price of coffee isn't likely to be reduced quickly, but neither is a drastic shortage in sight.

That was the opinion expressed by Helen Noyes, expert in Home Economics at Washington State college.

Miss Noyes said there is a world-wide shortage of about 3,000,000 bags of coffee beans this year. The exporting countries, chiefly Brazil, are producing 29,000,000 bags of the coffee beans, while the importers would like to have 32,000,000 bags.

She advised homemakers not to put by large stocks of coffee, because it would result in an artificial shortage and a stale cup of coffee on the breakfast table. Miss Noyes explained that ground coffee loses its flavor rapidly and does not keep well in storage.

The economics specialist blamed extended dry periods in the coffee producing countries and a reduction in the number of trees for the shortage. She said it may take five or six years for supply and demand to reach an equal level.
