Apathy in Diphtheria Outbreaks Draws Warning

PORTLAND, Dec. 1 — (AP) — A warning against public apathy in the current outbreaks of diphtheria in Jackson and Yamhill counties was issued yesterday by a state medical official.

Dr. Samuel B. Osgood, state epidemiologist, said the 27 cases in the two counties the past two months—and the loss of six lives—should be answered with immunization of children.

He said "virulent, highly fatal diphtheria is still with us and we cannot relax proven procedures that have been known and practiced in Oregon for many years."

He urged use of anti-toxin for immunization and told parents to follow this with "booster shots" annually from infancy through the elementary school years.
